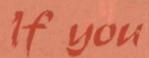


Getting it WRONG

Getting it wrong starts before you even get into the aircraft

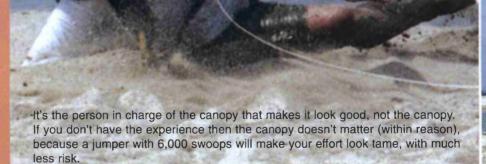


...buy the smallest, factest thing on the market, ignoring all the advice

...say to yourself, "I'm gonna have a go at that on my next landing" regardless of the fact that you only have 250 jumps

...secretly think you're as good as that professional

...then you are going to get it wrong! When you do, the canopy you have chosen, could leave you with a broken leg, or kill you



Accuracy is extremely important. The skilled pilot will not only come into land fast, but accurate as well, to the centimetre vertically and to the metre horizontally. You're flying a lethal weapon so be careful of letting off the 'safety catch' for you and others.

There is definitely a right way and a wrong way to learn the necessary skills. The process starts by jumping your bum off! Lots of jumps building up slowly with a huge degree of control and precision. Learn to use the front risers without letting go of your toggles, that way it is easier to abort when you miscalculate — and you will miscalculate. Start slowly with 45 degree turns and build up from there. Stay away from toggle turns. They increase the risk. Most important of all, take advice!



Pictures 1, 2 & 3 above show a vertical miscalculation, which could have had different results if it were not over water and onto a beach. At an estimated speed of 50 mph or more the jumper has a split second to adjust the flight trajectory during a swoop. In picture number 1, the toggles should have been a few centimetres lower giving the canopy half a metre more lift.

Picture 8 is a real classic. Our man is looking at where he wants to

go – but his left hand is steering the canopy in the other direction. Most of the latter photos show him hanging onto the toggles rather than controlling the canopy and, hence, his destiny. In photo 9, a PLF position, with feet and knees together, may have been a good idea. Easy to say now'd know he walked away and we should thank him for a great sequence of stills that really demonstrate what happens when you get it wrong.

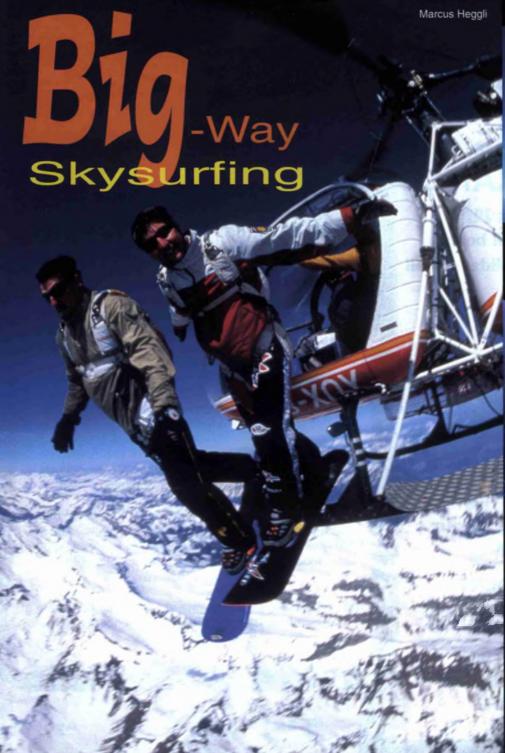

If you feel pressure on the 2-way grip and you start spinning around each other, stand straight on the board and work in the opposite direction. It will stop you. If the pressure gets to strong, just let go and start tracking towards a centre point between the other surfers. If you lose level and need to get higher, just bring your arms and your upper body forward, put your board in an 45 degree angle, catch air and you'll get lift. If you are too high, bring your arms in and try to get down. But it's easier to come up, so the surfer that is lower should work on floating.

There are many ways to fly together. You have to find the one you like the best. For example, some people bring the board in an angle and move sideways, others track around each other find a circle and take grips, some use their arms to move forward or backwards. At the end of the jump a good separation is very important. One surfer should pull at 4.500 feet, the rest of the group should track away and pull at 4.000 feet and 3.500 feet. Therefore you have enough separation in distance and altitude.

It will take some jumps until you'll be able to fly around each other and do everything you want to. But don't give up. It's so much fun! Learn to use your board and the teamwork in the sky and feel the spirit of surfing! I hope you will enjoy more of your skydives.

But it takes practice and time to be able to do all the moves, stay close together, be aware of what your partner is doing and to have fun.

It doesn't matter if you have a large or a small board, a piece of wood, a snowboard or a super carbon high tech board. It's more important that

you feel comfortable and can control your board before you start doing 2 or bigger ways. Safety comes first! Many people still underestimate the speed of a surfboard and the fact that you can get hurt.

A detailed ground briefing will make it easier. Talk about the exit, the programme, pulling etc. A good briefing will help you to have more fun and success. A bigger plane is better, too. You have more space in the door to hold on to each other and stand straight. Give a good exit count, so you will leave at the same time with no pressure on the grip. During freefall it is important that you always keep eye contact with your partner. Watch what he is doing and work together.

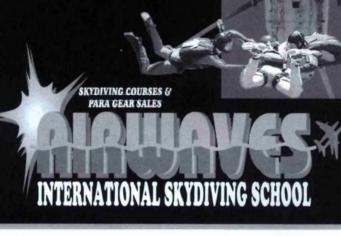

Jump on Track

Larsen and Brusgaard, the Danish manufacturer of the *Dytter* range of audible altimeters, have finally released onto the market as promised, their fully featured software to be used in conjunction with their *Pro-Track* audible alti and freefall data recorder. Called *Jump-Track*, the software is essentially an electronic log book that manipulates data from a Pro-Track. The Pro-Track/Jump-Track combo competes with Cool & Groovy's *Evolution 2000/Interface 2000* products which were released last year.

The Jump-Track package includes a CD-ROM and a small docking cradle which accepts the Pro-track. The system runs Windows 95/98/NT formats and is well designed and easy to use, with instructions and help available at a click of the rodent. The freefall data feature allows you to view your jumps in graph form showing altitude against time and provides a vertical speed profile, exit altitude, freefall time, deployment altitude, and average vertical speed.

A really funky feature allows you to run a digital video of your jump right there in a window on the screen and have it synched in with the graph showing your vertical speed, so that you can easily see how various body positions affect your fall-rate – nice one L&B!

The log book feature automatically logs the jumps from your Pro-Track, although you need to manually enter some fields such as Drop zone, aircraft type and equipment, or you can you set up preferences which will fill these in for you during the download if you always jump at the same DZ. You can add stamp-men (or stamp-women – Ed) type FS formations of your own or use the incorporated IPC dive pool. The data recording features of the Pro-Track may still be read without a Jump-Track by using its built-in LED screen, and the Jump-Track log book software feature may be used without a Pro-Track by manually entering jump data. They go on to recommend that all grommets now be countersunk so that any potential snag points are eliminated. Sunpath Inc have added a centre stow at the mouth lock of the Javelin main deployment bag. The Javelin bags now have three stows at the mouth lock. The idea is that the last stow to release will be the centre one, thus pulling the bag level with the horizon just prior to the canopy hitting the air.

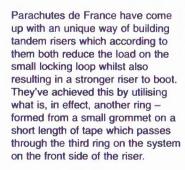


Sunpath claim that this mod assists high performance canopies to open on heading more often than they would with the conventional two stow mouth lock (which is not very often!). The new bag now comes standard with the Javelin or may be bought separately for around £35.

Holy BatRak Boneman

Those innovative little boneheads at the Bonehead factory in Perris, California, have come up with yet another funky looking camera helmet or two. Called the BatRak (because it looks like batman's hat and it takes a rack of cameras) this helmet is a hybrid between the company's DaBomb (Kit News Aug 99) and Flat-Top camera helmets. Like all Boneheads, it's moulded from carbon fibre and has a foam liner that conforms to the wearer's head shape. The BatRak is side opening making for easy access and egress and comes complete with a chin cup and neck strap. The bat ears make for flat sides which allow easy fitting of cameras, plus a top platform measuring 6 x 8.25 inches. The ears also provide plenty of room for audibles, camera switches, sandwiches etc. The HalfRak has only one ear (should have called it the Holyfield) and is suitable for a side mounted video and a top mounted stills.

The BatRak retails for around £330 whilst the HalfRak goes for just under £300.

All Voodoo to me!

Rigging Innovations, makers of the *Talon* and *Telesis* harness/container systems, have released a new rig onto the market with the freeflyer in mind. Called the *Voodoo*, the new rig is similar in looks to the Talon but with a *Vector 3* type main pin cover and continuous side flaps. RI claim that their new *V-Flex* harness design is more comfortable than existing designs (Oh yeah!) due to a longer main lift web and yoke, custom flat forged hip and chest rings, extra wide leg strap comfort pads, and an unusual leg strap/hip junction geometry.

Rogue Drogue NEXTed

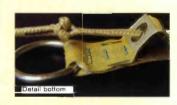
Paratec of Germany have been busy again!
They tell us that they've now solved the age old problem of rapid wear on tandem drogue bridles.

The new Paratec Drogue Concept 2 (PDC2) as they call it, incorporates a centre kill-line made from 4mm high molecular Dacron line with a breaking strain of 1,000kgs in place of the usual tubular nylon. This leads into a kevlar bridle through a stainless steel grommet, thus eliminating the constant damage to the two kevlar tapes normally used to keep the guiding ring in place.











On the bottom end they use a special, teflon coated, glass fibre tape sewn inside the bridle for friction-free protection. The grommet is made to sit up on its end to allow free passage of the bridle. Both ends of the bridle are separate lengths of Dacron attached by larksheads which allow them to be field replaced and also act as natural stops. Old style Next drogues as well as Vector type drogues may be retro fitted with the new PDC2.

The Relative Workshop have added a new size to their range of *Vector 3* containers to cope with the increase of smaller than 120 sized high performance mains now on the market. This time they've given the new size a name – *Micron*, and taken the opportunity to make a few other changes. RW claim that the Micron is the narrowest rig now available and suitable for main canopies of no more than 120sq ft. They've also improved on the bottom of container pilot chute and bridle protection and smoothed off the over-the-shoulder contour of the rig. The Micron is not available with the larger size 3-rings and type 8 webbing risers because they will not fit nicely under the rig's narrow riser covers.

(Although most small rigs are purchased with mini rings, the larger size have always been available. Some manufacturers will build mini type 17 risers with a large ring set to provide the best of both worlds. It's a retrograde step in my opinion when the large 3-ring option is excluded for merely aesthetic reasons, when they are in fact far safer. Large size 3-rings have a 4 to 1 mechanical advantage over mini rings, thus providing lower pull forces at cutaway time when high Gs may be experienced with small high performance canopy malfunctions.)

The new Microns are available with dual colour leg strap pads – allowing the inside of the pads to match the back pad (what they call 'body contact' panels) making for an overall attractive colour scheme.

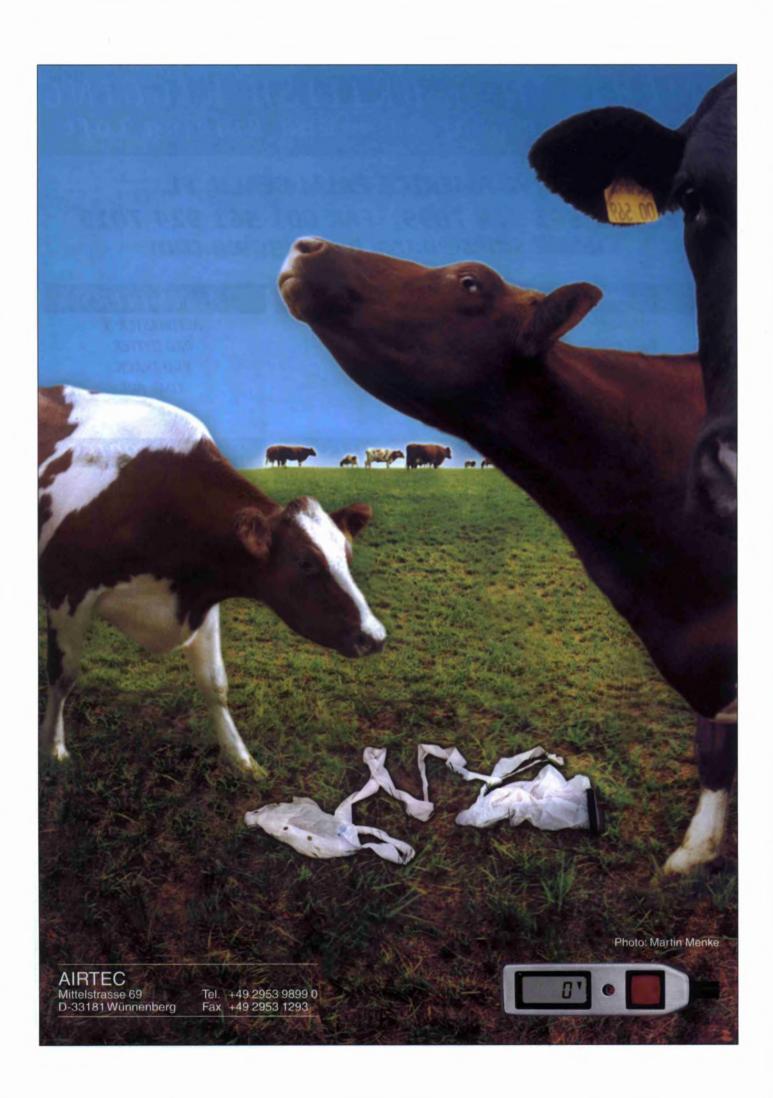

IS AFF REALLY EASY?

When you have finished your AFF is it really easy to do your consolidation jumps and is it really easy to talk to everyone at a parachute centre?

The reason I am asking these questions is now that I've done it, paid and qualified to Cat 8, the people concerned aren't really interested. Come to think of it they were not that bothered in the first place. Maybe it is because I can't get to the DZ as much as I would like. Surely I can't be expected to hang around all day everyday for a window in the weather?

When ringing about the weather (due to the DZ being 40 miles away), should I be told what they expect to happen? Or should I be told "It might be okay this afternoon, see you later"? Or should I be expected to ring Michael Fish? Should I feel inadequate when asking stupid questions like "When I jump out what exercises should I be doing as this is only my first consolidation jump?"

I don't know how the so-called experts at the drop zone I use cope with jumping from 13,000 ft but, believe me, I find it very difficult indeed and need a bit of help to enjoy the sport I am loving more every time I jump. I am new to this and I need help to overcome anxiety. I am not afraid to tell anyone this so why is it too much to expect a little help and understanding? Surely you are not born to be British champions, even they all did jump number one.

We can't comment on the treatment you've received at your 'zone but don't assume it is the same all over the country. Now you're Cat 8 (Congrats!), maybe try going to another drop zone if you're not getting on well at yours. It is a fact of life that British skydiving inevitably involves waiting for breaks in the weather, which are not predictable. But there are useful ground exercises to do and there is no excuse for poor attitude towards up and comings. It's important for us all to welcome newcomers and be open about the fact we all have had (and still do) rational and irrational fears.

PUTTING THE RECORD STRAIGHT

I'm sure Brian McGill's piece on page 62 (Club News) was well intentioned, but I'm afraid it's riddled with inaccuracies. This is not to deny credit to Don Hughes' achievements in the early days, but they shouldn't be allowed to detract from the achievements of others.

Don was not a member of the first British Parachute Team. The first World Championships were held in St Yan, France in 1951 and it wasn't until 1958 in Czechoslovakia that the British first fielded a National Parachute Team (which consisted of Mike Reilly, Dennis Lee, Jim McLoughlin and Sue Burges). In 1960 the World Meet was held in Bulgaria with Mike Reilly, Tony Charlton, Dennis Lee and Alf Card (no relation to Bob!) In 1962 Don Hughes was in the third British Team at the World Meet in the USA. Two years later he was the Brit Judge at the first World Meet at which a British Ladies Team (Helen Flambert, Penny Seager and Diana Knipe) competed.

For Brian to suggest that in the early '60's 'there were no rules and control' is completely untrue as the BPA was formed in 1961 with Mike Reilly as the first Chairman. He was killed parachuting into the Channel the following year and Dare Wilson took over and was largely responsible for the first set of BPA Safety Regulations. which appeared at that time. The Army Parachute Association was formed in 1962 and Rothmans donated the first DH89a Rapide - G-AJHO - to the APA in 1963, the year before Don Hughes was appointed first Chief Instructor at Netheravon. The story of the aeroplane purchase was told by the APA's first Secretary, Major John Weeks, in an hilariously funny article that appeared in the very first issue of Sport Parachutist entitled 'The Khaki Airline'. Edward Gardener, first Team Commander of the Red Devils, was the person responsible for the puchase of the first Parachute Regiment Bapide - G-AGTM and the purchase of RAPA's Rapide - G-ASRJ was negotiated by the APA Committee in 1964.

new millennium at 5.19am, twenty-five minutes before the same sun

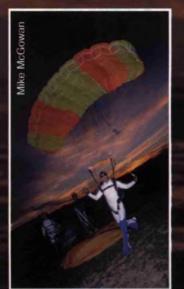

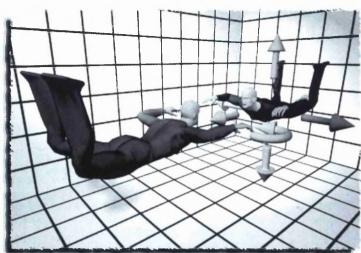

Not Compatible

A rigger was doing a normal six monthly repack and, on completion of the reserve, he started to pack the main. It was obvious that the main canopy was too small for the container and that the deployment bag was too big for the container.

Conclusions

The jumper was aware that the kit was not very compatible but stated that it worked okay. In my opinion this was an incident waiting to happen. The odds of having a malfunction were greatly increased by this mismatched equipment.

Recommendations

Always make sure that your main components are compatible with each other, if in doubt ask your rigger or reserve packer.

Chest Strap Releases

Three reports have been received reference chest straps coming undone during freefall or deployment. One jumper noticed his prior to deploying and crossed his arms to ensure they stayed in the harness.

Conclusions

In all cases proper flight line checks were reported to have been done correctly and in one particular case an instructor checked one jumper while explaining to him the importance of double checking that chest strap was routed correctly. Could it be that some particular rigs, which have no turn back on the edges or have only single thickness webbing, are more susceptible to unthreading?

Recommendations

More information is required on this one. Please let me know if any one else has had similar problems and on what type of rig. In the meantime be careful to check all chest straps.

Radio Radio

An instructor was talking down a student on the radio while wearing his rig. While transmitting to the student, the instructor's Cypres fired. The Cypres had the protective silver sleeve installed and was in service date.

Conclusions

In this case the Cypres main body case had a crack in it which was a contributing factor as the unit was not correctly sealed. However, just as a preventative measure, I will be taking my rig off before talking any one down with the radio.

Recommendations

It's generally good advice to keep rigs with a Cypres away from any radios.

Flaps Away

I have received half a dozen reports of bridle lines flapping in freefall and main containers prematurely opening In all cases the jumpers deployed higher than normal and the canopies opened okay.

Conclusions

In some of these cases the jumpers them selves did not notice. However, quick thinking by others in the group, AFF instructors who gave a pull signal prevented, the situation from getting worse.

Recommendations

Make sure that any velcro holding the bridle line is effective and that all the bridle is stowed correctly and cannot work loose. Finally, have a quick check prior to exit to ensure it has not been caught during the aircraft ride.

Safety Tag Unsafe

An embarrassing situation occurred when a drop zone checked a rig prior to allowing it to be used and a safety tag was placed on the rig to show it had been inspected.

Unfortunately the safety tag was placed on the reserve housing above the RSL ring that was designed to pass over that particular spot.

Conclusions

Adding this safety tag to let every one know that the rig had been inspected would have prevented the RSL from working as designed. It could have caused the main canopy to hang up while the reserve was being deployed.

Recommendations

Please be very careful when adding anything to a rig, even something as small as a safety tag, make absolutely sure it will not hinder any part of the system from working.

F111 Problems

Since the previous incident reports I have received an alarming number of standard type malfunctions on large, docile F111 canopies. They include almost everything from lineovers, bag locks, high twists with sliders stuck up, streamers etc.

Conclusions

It is possible to get a malfunction even with the best equipment and the best packing, but nevertheless a lot of these malfunctions can be put down to poor packing techniques and checks.

Recommendations

It's easy to become complacent when packing student kit as it's generally very forgiving. However if all packers and trainee packers stay alert and question the standards every now and then, this could help to reduce the problem and prevent some student reserve rides.

Total Chaos

Six reports of total malfunctions have been reported and are very much related so I will discuss these together. The causes of these reported reserve rides were floating pin pulls, hard pulls and one through

not being able to find a BOC toggle.

Conclusions

This is an ongoing problem that keeps happening. It is sometimes caused by poor equipment maintenance and other times by the deployment device being dislodged in the aircraft or on exit. The hard pulls were all packing errors, which are easily done when jumpers are new to pin pull systems.

Recommendations

Being aware of this potential problem and its possible preventative measures is the best advice. When changing systems learn as much as possible about the possible problems from others.

Borrowed Kit

An experienced cameraflyer borrowed a rig with a leg strap throwaway, and used it in conjunction with his clip winged camera suit. On releasing the pilot chute, it tried to deploy through the wing causing a total malfunction.

Conclusions

Borrowed equipment seems to give an alarming number of incidents. Even though this cameraffyer was aware of the potential problem and tried to work past the wings, this was not successful.

Recommendations

Think very carefully about the type of jump when borrowing kit. All sorts of problems are due to complacency about borrowing other equipment.

Is the new breed of flight recorder as safe as we think?

Skydiving is a sport in its infancy. It only became possible in the twentieth century, so is still changing at a tremendous rate. With this comes parallel development in peripheral areas such as rigging, training, DZ management, camerawork, marketing and more.



We've all heard of the 'good old days', that's when we had cameramen – irrespective of sex, ability or format, that's what they were. They filmed on 16mm, super 8, video and stills; the filmed on 16mm, super 8, video and stills; the really brave used 35mm and had large necks. They used belly mounts, wrist mounts, arm mounts, top mounts and side mounts and were available for hire and reward (if they were smart).

Then a new breed emerged, of cameraflyers, who became part of a team and portrayed their partner in an artistic manner for competitive reasons and for an audience.



Then Sony re-wrote the rules through miniaturisation, they invented the PC7. Now anyone and everyone can bolt on a camera and record their skydive – their flight. I call this new breed the flight



How do we differentiate and what are the skills required?...

skydive



Here I have defined three distinct categories, although there are obviously blurred lines between them.

Technical skills

The use of a sight is important as by fixing a sighting device you are effectively giving yourself a pinpoint focus for the skydive which places that function as a priority.

Cameramen

These guys effectively take video, film and photographs for hire and reward. Their main function is to capture the skydive for a specific



audience. They include tandem photographers, film-makers and general photographers covering everything from AFF to fun jumps. In all probability the competition team cameramen (FS & CF) belong in this category. They are fairly interchangeable between teams though some will argue that their cameraman will offer competitive advantage to their results, especially at high level.

Technically they usually work with video and stills. Typically video is moving from Hi8 and most serious cameramen will be using digital. The very serious will be on 3 chip digital cameras and possibly DVCam rather than mini DV. This category used to be the entry point into camerawork and we see a wide range of abilities. The better cameramen have fantastic flying skills and good technical skills with knowledge of light, depth of field (and all the inputs that affect it), lenses, film, jumpsuits, camera-mounts etc. Many will even have sales and marketing skills to enhance the revenue from their work.

They become very self sufficient in the air, aware of the dangers, canopy openings, safety systems on helmets and of all the things that can and do go wrong technically and during the skydive. This knowledge is all part of the trade and should be learnt.

Cameratiyer

Simon Ward

These are the guys you see with the skysurfers and freeflyers. They make their partners shine and add to the aesthetics of the skydive for the viewer. Creativity is shared between cameraflyer and performer. As pointed out above, a Formation Skydiving competition team may claim to have a cameraflyer and it is equally likely that a cameraflyer will end up as a flight recorder or cameraman on another kind of jump.

The best cameraflyers have arguably the best flying skills of all the camera people; they can fly in any position with gear on their head. Technically their primary medium is video, 1 or 3 chip cameras with wide lenses, though you will often find them using a stills camera on occasion. They are very aware of their partner and of the dangers of flying in close proximity, especially with surfboards. They use full face helmets and are very air aware, especially at break-off and dump time.



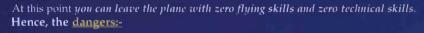

Flight Recorder

This is where we hear the warning klaxons, danger is everywhere. At worst a flight recorder requires absolutely no flying skills and no technical skills. It is the new, cheap entry into flying with a camera and rarely regulated.

Against this is the advantage that the sport has gained from these new toys. Because it is now so easy to strap a small palm, digital pc to a lightweight helmet, many are doing it. Add a super wide lens, forget the sight and off you go. It is not uncommon to see everyone on the dive with a small camera. In terms of training and available footage to the media, the benefits are just fantastic. They make our sport come alive and are ideal for use:

- * by AFF instructors
- * inside competition teams
- * inside big formations
- for POV (Point Of View) shots
- * to show all angles of a dive for training purposes
- for editing into a production as they provide a huge volume of footage.



- * lots of low experience freeflyers
- usually no checks as to the suitability to jumping camera or the equipment used
- * often no safety system on the helmet, and I mean much more than a Fastex snap fastener
- * often protruding camera mounts that can catch risers and lines
- * out-of-control flying with metalwork on the head makes for painful dockings!
- * lack of knowledge and thought of what to do when things go wrong
- * camera helmets not strapped in for take-off are effective projectiles in crash situations
- * it's the other jumpers on the load who are often at risk.

I appreciate that this is at one end of the spectrum but let's remember a would-be cameraman normally has a thirst for the knowledge, they want to take pictures and make videos and will go to some lengths to research and learn the trade. The cameraflyer and flight recorder may not be as aware of these dangers unless taught.

Summary and Conclusions

The invention of the mini digital pc is without doubt one of the best things to happen to our sport. We now have a wealth of high quality footage from all aspects of skydiving. As in other areas we are developing specialist skills under a single umbrella and I think that within camerawork we have:

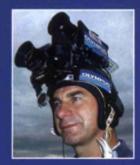
- * Cameraman portrays the subject as required
- * Cameraflyer part of a creative partnership
- * Flight Recorder the camera sees what they see

All improve the image of the sport.

On the negative side we are creating new dangers for ourselves. I call upon the manufacturers of helmets and camera-mounts to develop far safer products for the evolving specialist market, especially the

have one or two great examples of engineering we have many that are potential death traps.

On the drop zone, let's encourage all forms of camera work safely. I'm not after minimum jump numbers and any restrictive practices, I'm advocating we aid, coach, encourage and keep safe the new breed of camera person as they help to bring our sport alive.

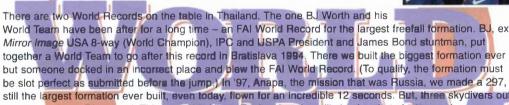
Dreams True

Rob Colpus

Since 1994, legendary skydiver BJ Worth has been trying for an official FAI World record. On two separate events his World Team built the largest ever formation... but both times failed to qualify for an FAI official record. This time they were successful, George Pilkington describes the action, in his own inimitable style.

Monday 29 November and we leave Heathrow Airport for Bangkok to be part of World Team 99. Thirty Brits in all are part of this historic event. When we arrive in Thailand, a local tells us of the customs of his people and the 'Land of Smiles' as he put it. "Even if you offend us, a smile should put it right" he said, I took that on board, and do you know, IT WORKED!

World Team have been after for a long time - an FAI World Record for the largest freefall formation. BJ, ex still the largest formation ever built, even today, flown for an incredible 12 seconds. But, three skydivers out meant no official FAI record. This year, '99, Ubon, Thailand, we're still chasing that elusive goal

The second record is easier in theory but, in practice, kind of hairy. A World Record Mass Jump. December 2, into Sunam Luang, Bangkok. Check out the photo to right - there's nowhere else to go! The jump is to start the birthday celebration of His Majesty the King. The World Team is joined by 200 top Thai skydivers including military dignitaries such as Commander in Chief of the Royal Thai Army and General Hugh Shelton, Supreme Commander of the US Military (he reports to Bill Clinton). In all, 572 skydivers from 38 different nations jump out of five Hercules

and a Fiat G222.

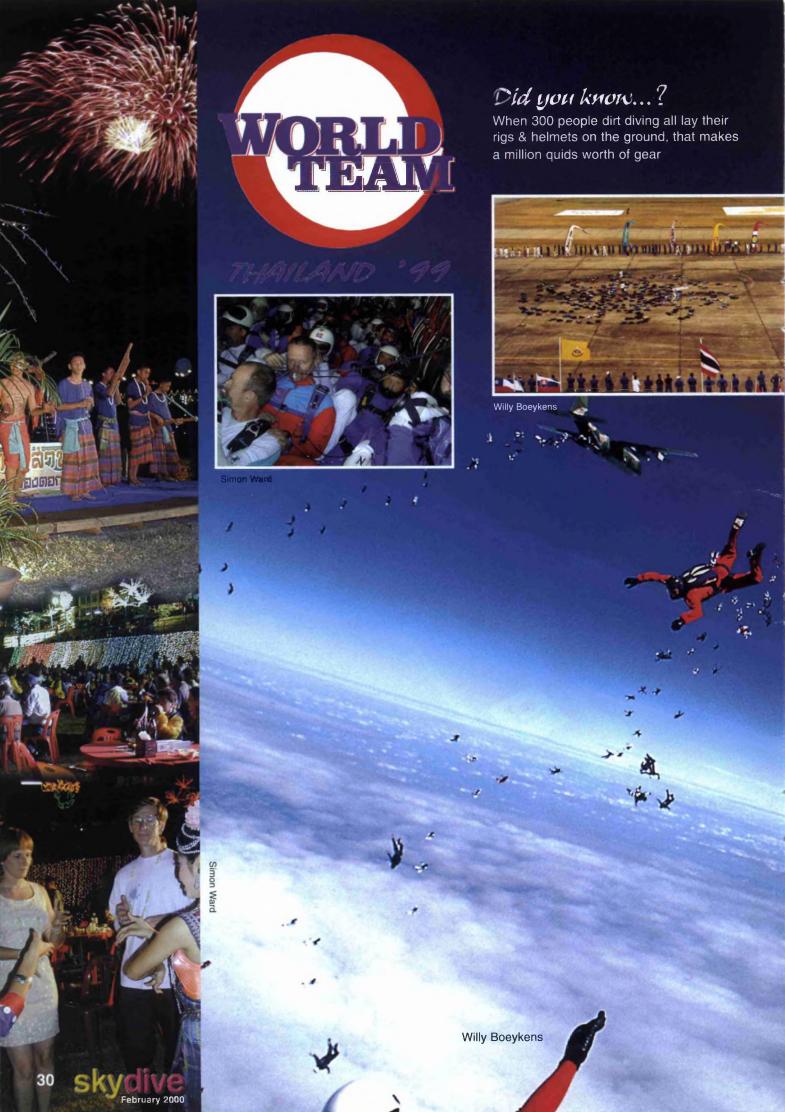
The number 572 is chosen for its symbolism, honouring Thailand's previous King Rama V and its current King Bhumipolum the occasion of his 72nd birthday. The jump is flawless and we are received like hernes (all 572 of (is!). Throughout the gig, the Thais treat us as honoured guests with a welcome and hospitality second to none.

We are there for two weeks, with 320 hand-picked skydivers and aim to break the World FAI Record of 246, set in 1998, in Chicago, USA. We have four Hercs, world renowned organisers of outrageous calibre and the experience of BJ Worth and his 21 'Super Captains' to bind it all together. Surely we can't fail? But if World Records were easy, everyone would be doing it! Early jumps are worrying but gradually things improve. The excitement builds as the loads get nearer the magic 300.

A Great Leveller

A 300-way attempt, exit at 22,000ft, my nightmare dive from hell! There's the bell. Oh God! Take three more massive tokes on the oxygen, and head for the tailgate. Line up... and we're off. Over the gate, boom, onto the 'Hercules Massive' (meaning slipstream, but its a little more aint it..) and pick up visual on Alexis. Roll onto my back and rock off down there. And roll out, fly into the swarm of skydivers around the forming base. Yep this is cool. Hold on! Where am I? Oh No! No! This aint right. Turn left, hack through a load of blues, must be over here. Oh no, this aint right either. I'm falling.. Boom! I've

landed on a low blue dude. Oh Sh*# !... Now I'm low and its time to break off.

On the ground, by the time I'm back to the team, Dazzle's in the middle of a debrief. "What happened George?" asks Dazzle, I tell him. "Brain not working, must've been hypoxia!" "Yeah, well, I already told Kate Cooper it was your first mistake. Fire in head mate! Real difficult to put out in a minute!" says Dazzle with a smile. We laugh. I go to find Cool Kat (Rob Colpus) "Hey Rob, have a word with my suit will you, it's not working!" "Right suit, get your stuff together" said Rob. "OK that should do it George, but go and rub it on some of my team's suits, they're all flying great!" So I find Eagerly (Jim Keery, he flies like an eagle, even on only 15 jumps a year) and rub my leg against his suit. Magically it works, the suit performs faultlessly from now on. (Thanks for the faith Dazzle! And, you are a World Class organiser mate! It's a pleasure to see you in action.)

Big loads really are the great leveller. You have to keep your wits around you, two mistakes and you're on the ground, hot shots n' all.

"Are you scared BJ?" I ask. "No, are you?" "You bet I am, in fact I'm scared shitless. 300-way at 22,000 feet, it's very close to the 'unnecessary riskscategory!" He laughed and we go to the planes. So that's why he's the James Bond stunt double, nerves of steel.

150 way Base Practise.

We come down in the planes from a 300-way attempt, there's some low cloud and one plane runs out of oxygen. Am I happy or sad? Happy - I'm happy! I'm still alive so I'm happy! The Captains decide there's enough height to do a 150 base jump. Dazzle's 'Euro Roast Beef' team is in the base, so off we go. On run-in, there is zero pressure. 3 Hercs for a 150-way. Nice. We run in at 13,500ft. Exit good and the skydive magical. 148-way with break-off at 49 seconds. Yahoo, that feels great. For me, the second best jump of the gig.

Magical C's

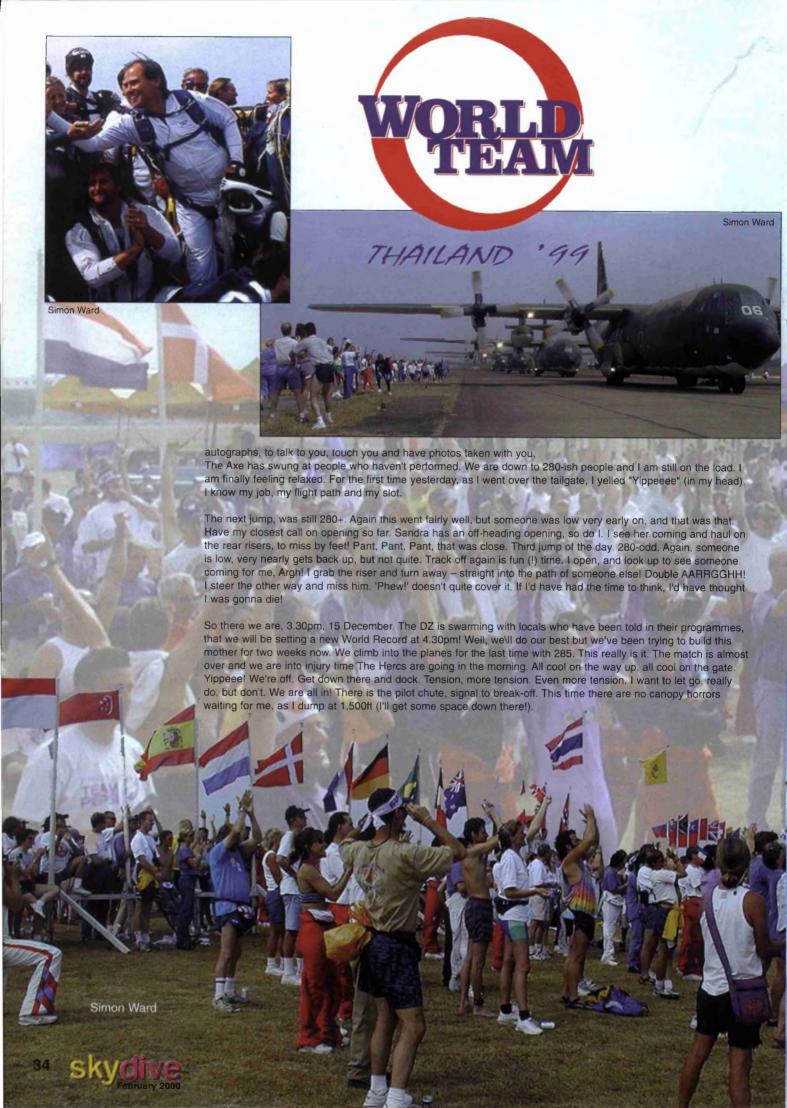
Things are not going too well. Kate Cooper & BJ have been 'blowing smoke up our asses' for days, in an attempt to motivate the World Team. We need John Robbins! John was the 'Magic Man' in Bratislava and Anapa; at both gigs the best skydives were made, after John spoke his words and blew his 'Magic Dust' on us. At the next dirt dive, BJ and Dan are making changes to the formation, as they believe it is the reason why we are having so many problems with the blue quadrants. BJ finishes up and says "And now long time World Team member George Pilkington would like to say a few words".

"Hello World Team. I can't tell you how pleased I am to hear that the formation is at fault, and that's why we aint been building it, coz I thought we were skydiving like turkeys!" Everyone sort of laughs. I say some of the usual drivel, and all of a sudden, out of the blue comes this "What I would like you all to think about are the 'Three C's'. On these skydives, You need to be COOL, You need to be CALM, and you need to be CONNECTED."

The Last Day

Well here we are again, last day, still no world record. Just like Bratislava '94 and Anapa, '97. The DZ is heaving with about 5,000 Thais. A school bus of children arrives after a journey of 500 miles, to watch us. Wow! They want





When I get back, the DZ is pretty subdued. Sherry Schrimsher, FAI Chief Judge tells us that we built the biggest complete formation ever, 285 – Oh Yes! But we only held it for 1.1 seconds – Oh No! Blast! No stinkin' FAI World Record. Not again!

That night we are treated to a banquet hosted by the Governor of Ubon. In his speech he makes us all feel very honoured with his words: "World Team, we, the people of Ubon Ratachani will never forget you. Each time we look up into the skies we will remember you. You came to Ubon and risked your lives in our skies to build a new World Record, in honour of our beloved King's Birthday. In your sport you pay him homage. We thank you for this and we will NEVER forget the World Team." It's enough to move you to tears. Even Kevin McCarthy is nearly welling up.

Dona Crum

Dona Crum

Many skydivers are sad, no 'bit of paper'. A Guinness World Record, but not official from the FAI. Me? Well I certainly am not sad. We had just built four consecutive 280+ ways. A first. We had built and flown the world's largest complete formation. I try to console myself and others but we still all feel a sense of failure.

Extra Time

That night BJ andAir Vice Marshall Bunchuay call the Chief of Defence Staff in Bangkok, who was dining with the King and Queen at the time, and asks if we can hang onto the Hercs for one more day. He buys two more jumps. 11.30am and the World Team is on the tarmac, kitted up, ready. BJ does his final speech. "Its the end now. We won't have these people together again, ever. Let's do it now please. One jump only." We all agree. Alexis takes the mike. "Guys, lets concentrate and keep the World Team's safety record. We haven't broken anyone yet, let's not make it now." We go to the planes and fly to altitude. There is a real calm in the planes. The formation flying is superb, just like *Brit100*, but with much bigger planes. Herman holds up his white board at four minutes, and for the first time we see the final equation: COOL + CALM = ALL CONNECTED.

Aleya and I step onto the Hercules 'Massive', for the last time. We are into extra time! I look down at Ubon's Moon River shining in the sun. Roll over and race down there. There is Alexis, Yahoo. Roll out and fly in. Following Aleya, she docks, I dock. Tension. More tension. "Arggh!" I yell. But I aint letting go. The tension eases, the formation flattens and I look around (sneakily coz you're not supposed to...) only cameras are not holding on. Oh Yes! I geek Dazzle, he don't geek back. (I've been there too! – Ed). Pilot chute and the tension goes. I wait for the next one, there. I turn and blast off. Bleeps in my ear, four grand already! There is Suzanna 3 metres ahead, double bleeps, "Come On Suz, Dump!" She dumps, I dump. The Flat Line screaming in my ear is the referee's whistle, thinks I, but it's okay, cos the ball is in the BACK OF THE NET!

The DZ goes mad. Just like *Brit100*, but three times bigger and more intense. Finally the World Team have done it. A 282-way formation, held complete for 7.11 seconds, well in excess of the required 3 by the FAI. It took five years in total and about 90 jumps to get it right, but get it right we did. In the last relative seconds of the millennium, BJ Worth's dream was realised.

And finally...

To be part of this fantastic event was an honour and a privilege. World Team 2002? - I'm there!

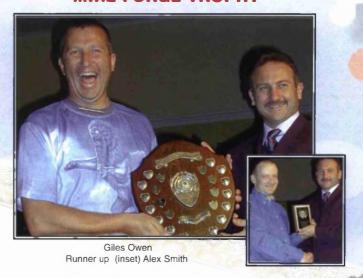

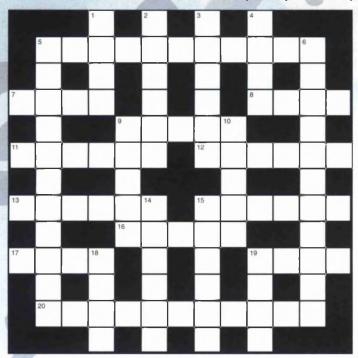

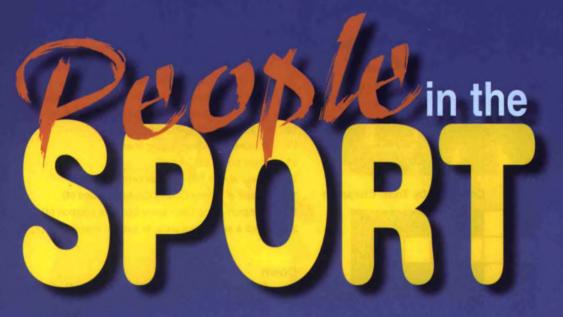

made several skydiving movies, including the renowned *From Wings Came Flight*. Norman has three joys in life; photography, skydiving and love.

He made his first film at 14, a shoot-em-up. At 19, he took up skydiving, jumped camera on his 27th skydive and then met his third passion, Deanna, whom he soon married. They worked on many projects together, always speaking to each other on the phone several times a day, if apart. Deanna changed

Norman's life. Tragically, she died of Crest syndrome, a rare lung disease, on April 20, 1997. Here, Norman talks of his latest creation, *Willing to Fly* and how he finished this powerful film without her.

You started your life as a cinematographer, how did this translate into skydiving?

Skydiving was a great world to explore with film, not only is it a complicated and rich environment for exploration, but it's a challenging world to try to translate to the viewers, both skydivers and non-skydivers alike I am not as concerned with what is happening in front of the camera, but rather, how what is happening in front of the camera appears.

What is more important to you, still images or moving pictures?

Both media are very important to me. Still film allows me to be very violent and aggressive with my flying, and then for just a split second, I hold my breath and shoot, and that is what you see, just that split second. Movie film allows me to show more of a story with a start and a finish. Both are equally challenging and rewarding. I would love to do another still film project; I keep talking about that.

Is Willing to Fly aimed at jumpers or non-jumpers?

The film is aimed at people, I hope that it is appealing to the person in each skydiver. As skydivers, many like images just because it is us in front of the camera, or just because we know that what is happening is hard or cool. In this film, I searched for images that could apply to all people. This is why many of the subjects in the film are common and have been seen before (4-way, 10-way, freestyle, style, CRW) I wanted to show an unusual perspective of usual events. Some non-skydivers would say there is nothing usual about the events, so for them it is more that I want to give them an access to a world that they have not yet experienced.

How successful has it been with the public?

It is too soon to say, in that the film is still very young and the first people we wanted to share it with were the skydiving community. But as I say that, the reaction among non-skydivers has also been amazing, they can't believe what I did is possible, they always ask, "where is the camera and how is it so steady?" Additionally, I am working on a new feature film and many of the participants in the project want to know "why they have never seen anything like this before..." So I would say the reaction so far has been really great.

How big a production was Willing to Fly?

There were over 600 people on the credit list, both performers and production people and we shot over 32 hours of footage for this project.

Were you touched by interacting with the performers?

Yes, very touched, as a matter of fact that was the whole reason for making the film. I wanted to be touched by people performing just for the love of it and at the same time. I was filming for the love of filming. It was like, " I am doing what I love, they are doing what they love, what does that look like?" - It looks like Willing to Fly.

Why did you shoot in 35mm film?

Quality, film is superior in the range and quality of what you can capture, and 35mm is almost four times as big as 16mm movie film. Additionally, I wanted these images to have the ability to reach as large an audience as possible and 35mm film reaches where video does not.

Was that very physically demanding?

Yes, my 35mm movie camera set-up weighs 32lbs and I shoot with it all day long, day after day. With video, the advances in technology have led to smaller and smaller cameras, but with film cameras that is not the case; the film does not change size so you can only go so small. The high speed flying such as head down and the deployments are the most strenuous areas.

Do you think you might even affect people's lives with a film of such power?

I am counting on it! That is the reason I did the film, I wanted to know what it is like to watch people in love with what they are doing? How do those type of images affect the viewers? - that was my search. I say that every time someone watches Willing to Fly they will 'see' a different film. What they 'see' is based on their surroundings, their mood, what type of system they watch it on, everything really. Willing to Fly is an interactive film, that is why half of the project is a book. The film will grow as the viewers explore it!

What was the start of the dream and how did you make up the storyboard?

That is a complex question which could take up an entire article, but I will try to answer it briefly. The movie really is about life, the translation from skydiving into life is the challenge. Willing to Fly began as a conversation about what is possible when you are in love. Sara Ryan is a very dear friend of mine and she drew the illustrations and wrote the poetry in the book. Those illustration were my 'storyboard'. Sara and I would speak about life and she would summarise our conversations in illustrations. That was the framework for the exploration, an exploration of perspectives. Then I decided which parts of skydiving would best carry the ideas.

The music was written for the film but which came first, chicken or egg? In Willing to Fly. I wanted the music and visual elements to be given equal importance, I did not want to have to make pieces fit, rather I wanted the joining to be more natural. I had a master plan of what I wanted the music to be. From there I edited the sections of the film and sent the sections to the music composers (Rick Conrad and Jeff Carruthers). They would then compose the music and send it back to me.

From there I would fine tune the edit to blend with the music, sometimes the piece would go back and forth many times and sometimes it was right on the first time. This project was the first time where the images and music both 'met in the middle' in post production. I am very happy with the result and I think the music is amazing.

How much did the movie evolve during its making?

Tremendously, as that was part of the plan. This movie was a personal exploration, a journey that grew and evolved as my life did. The movie was about a journey, not about an end point. At the end of the film in the narration the eternal swooper says "Where is the end? - at the beginning; where is the beginning? - at the end". As I was trying to complete the project, this idea became very tricky, since if there is no end, when do you finish? But then I realised there is a difference between completion and finding an end point.

Is there anything you would do differently if you were to remake it?

No, not a thing, but let me explain. I am sure that I would do many things differently in my next projects, but each image in *Willing to Fly* is a result of living and seeing what was there, and that exploration I would never change.

How close was Deanna's character to the Skydancer she plays?

Very close because Deanna was a dreamer and she was constantly dreaming of flight. She also walked the beach that you see in the beginning of the film every day of her life here. That is where she created many of her moves. She was about dreaming, not competing. Many of the concepts of *Willing to Fly* began with her and were learned by me as I lived my life with her. But the important thing to know is that the film is not about Deanna, rather it is about the essence of a dreamer. The Skydancer section is about transformation – the Skydancer is transformed into the Eternal Swooper and it is from there that the narration comes. So, the 4-way is about the 4-way, not about the Skydancer or the Eternal Swooper. The Eternal Swooper is just our narrator that is leading us through the journey of *Willing to Fly*.

When she died, did you feel like scrapping the film?

When she died there was a point when I felt like scrapping everything, but never just the film. Her death became part of who I was as a film maker, but at the same time, the concept of the film did not depend upon Deanna. When Deanna died, I had to re-evaluate everything in my life and that included this project.

Do you feel Deanna is still with you?

Yes. Everyone has their own beliefs about how people exist once they are no longer in the physical, but for me it even more simple then that. Just knowing Deanna changed me and my knowledge of her is something that is always with me. She exists in my thoughts so she is real for me, just like all the people with whom I share my life.

Was your son Ramsey always going to be involved?

No, not at all. Ramsey began skydiving after Deanna died. I was not going to push Ramsey to skydive, I told him I would support him in what ever he loved doing – but the choice was up to him. Once Ramsey made the choice to skydive, that still did not make him an automatic choice for the film. He had to work to bring his skill levels up so that he could fly with the other performers; he did that and more! I am really proud of him!

Is Nicole anything like her film character?

Yes, she is like her character in that she is very playful and very beautiful. Nicole had never modelled or performed before but she was a natural because for her it was all about the play – the play of a romantic encounter between cameraman and performer which leads to her losing track of altitude. Nicole is about fun and adventure and that is what I think her part portrayed. As far as her outfits go, she was game to try anything, if I had asked her to shave her head or dye her hair pink, she would have loved to do that too – that is why I love her and love filming her.

Does it feel contradictory to start making the film with your wife and end it with your girlfriend?

I am glad that you asked that question! I had a full life with Deanna and I was fortunate enough to complete with her. Even though it seems that losing your life slowly is difficult, it gives you time to explore the transition with the people who you love. Deanna and I were committed to living fully through that transition as we had done with so many other transitions in our life. I asked Deanna before she died "What will I do now that you are not here?" and Deanna answered "All the things that you could not do with me." It was clear that everything in my life would be new — loving, having relationships, filming, everything! What I did not want to do is the same thing, I was not looking for a replacement for Deanna. I learned after meeting Nicole, that you can start a relationship with a new person and that becomes a brand new life. Willing to Fly is about perspectives and my life would not have been complete without stepping into a new life or perspective, so actually it is very natural that Nicole would be in the film.

Additionally, it might not have been possible to finish the film without Nicole's support; personally and as a performer and producer. So Nicole being part of this project is not contradictory, it just reflects the natural changes and stories of my life.

How did you film so close to the *Airspeed* openings and *XTZ* star?

With XTZ and Airspeed, I was so close that there was contact. But the reason it was 'safe' was because of the level of the performers. They all loved what they were doing and it was fun to them-they were consciously pushing their limits, which allowed me to push the limits of what was possible. As the Airspeed guys deployed, they were slapping me on the way up – they were aware of their every move – they did not pull and close their eyes! The up close and personal views of XTZ came from me with my helmet camera being part of their actual exit – that was quite a ride!

I loved the swoop landings and pond crashes – where did that idea come from?

The ideas of the crashes came from Rambo crashing by accident the first time (that is covered in the book). The crash was so gorgeous and spectacular that it became a place I wanted to explore!

Tell me about flying with Frightful the Falcon and the last minute phone call inviting you to film with him

It was completely awesome to fly so close to a bird, to share flight with a being that I have admired for ever! The phone call was just destiny, like all of the other parts of the film!

How much do you live your own life by the philosophies of the Skydancer?

This is how I live my life, yet I get lost in life just the same. For me the philosophy of the Skydancer is an ongoing philosophy of life — it is about perspective, and love and about a life that grows and changes every day!

Have you always been a spiritual person?

No, I learned all of that with Deanna and it then became a part of my life.

What qualities do you admire in people?

The ability to love, to live in perspectives and to play all out!

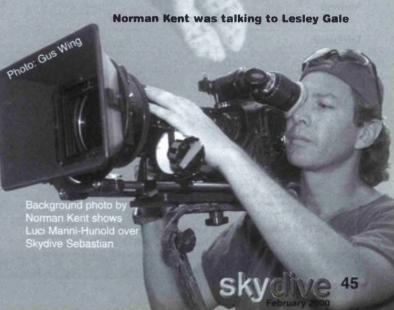

WILL have a G92 permanently positioned at the DZ!

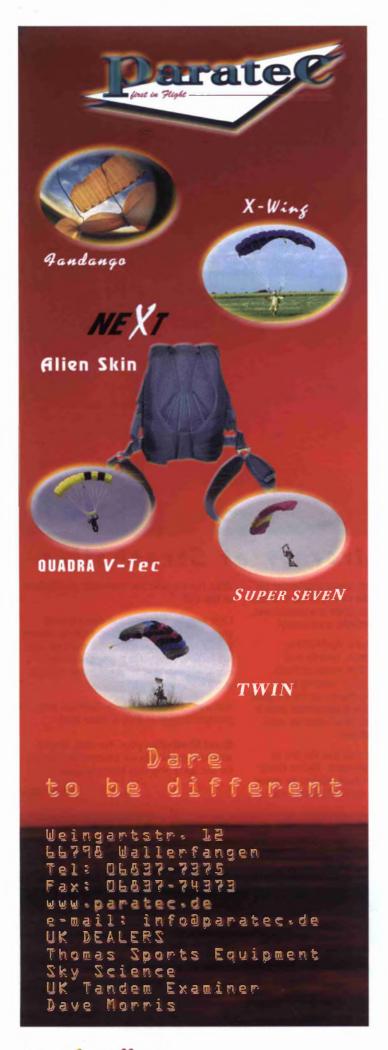

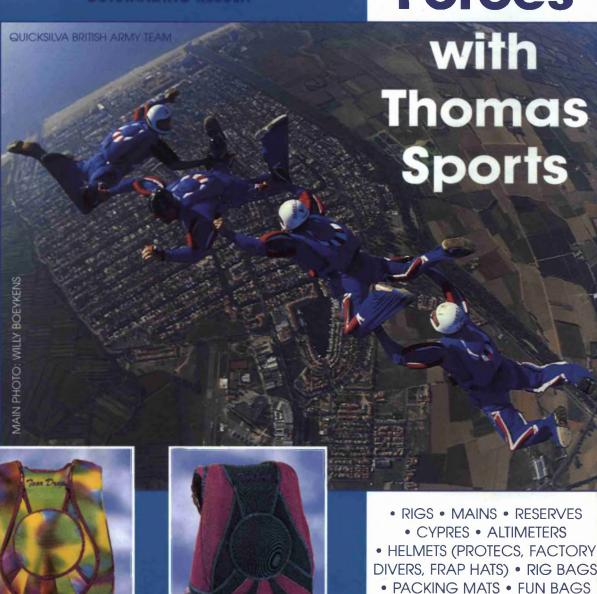
