Good old bank holiday weather. We lost five days to winds with an average speed of 30 mph, but still achieved around 2,000 jumps in the remaining four days.

Nonetheless, both weekends saw eight organised FS groups under the direction of Milko, Dave Lewis, Phil Curtis, Billy Payn, Katie Woods, Brian Laithwaite and Fiona Birnie. We concentrated on single-aircraft loads and groups of around twelve, with multi-aircraft formations planned for the end of the day. We managed one! Michael Mackenzie and Al Hodgson were on hand to look after the freefly contingent.

During the week, Brian Vacher ran his Safe Flight School canopy course for 15 people, and did a grand job of keeping up the interest even though the wind prevented much actual practising...















The only midweek day of proper jumping improved matters as the Antonov AN28 got under way, and we had the helicopter in to the delight of many – and the dismay of the B Certificate people who suddenly found themselves jumpmastering it! "5-back, please!"

The 25 people who registered to jump the balloon were, you guessed it, disappointed by the wind – but who wants to get up at dawn, anyway? Apparently many do, so we're planning more balloon jumps later on in the year.

For the newer skydiver, the AN28 with its wide open tailgate was a scary prospect during take-off. It didn't half get up there quick though and made for fun exits. The jumpers enjoyed it, so we'll try and get it back for another go.

The biggest party of the boogie was on the final Saturday, with a great band who just kept on going to meet audience demand. The evening kicked off with Langar's first major tombola/raffle, with about £7,000 worth of donated prizes. Over a dozen skydiving suppliers provided a host of discount vouchers, clothing items and free jumps, with major prizes from Bodyflight (an hour of tunnel time!) and Aerodyne (a Smart reserve won by Tim Aucott, pictured).












# PDFT Update

The PD Factory Team recently completed its third training week at Skydive Elsinore, with its five new members; Brian Vacher, Pablo Hernandez, Jessica Edgeington, Tommy Delibac and Ian Drennan. The team were flying the new PD Competition Velocity, with a variety of wing loadings. The team familiarised themselves with the new FAI 2009 Accuracy rules. Competitors now collect a full 100 points by dragging all water gates and land in a 2 metre square box to avoid penalty. The positive scoring zones from previous years are now negative scoring zones varying in penalty depending how far from the 2 metre box first contact is made. The new layout of the new accuracy course creates different problems and strategies.



The team has a busy educational programme of canopy courses, with Brian Vacher's Safe Flight School running events in the UK and mainland Europe, and Flight-1 courses across the pond.

The Anatomy of Stretching



Nutshell No fuss guide to flexibility

If you want to learn how to develop your flexibility in a safe, no fuss way then this is the book for you. Here is a fully illustrated guide demonstrating

exercises



covering every stretch imaginable. The opening chapters explain all you need to know to develop a top-notch programme. The author, Brad Walker, talks about what flexibility is, the benefits, and the different types of stretching. This will help you understand how being flexible can make a real difference to your skydiving.

As with any training, safety is very important and he sums it up nicely in this statement, 'There are no good or bad stretches; only what is appropriate for the specific requirements of the individual. So a stretch that is perfectly okay for one person may not be ok for someone else'. This really is the key point about flexibility; the super athletic sportsperson will have very different capabilities to someone who hasn't done any activity for a while. This book will support you to find out your limitations and develop a programme to suit your individual needs.

This is all done in the first 36 pages of the book; the remaining 114 are completely dedicated to the exercises. For each stretch there are illustrated examples demonstrating how to execute the stretch and the anatomy involved, along with which sports and injuries the stretch is beneficial for.

This is a great reference for anyone involved with sport, especially if you want to get straight to the point and keep it simple. Okay so a few of the diagrams could have been more technically correct (be alert to dodgy posture) and unsurprisingly it doesn't make any references to skydiving in the lists of sports the stretches benefit. However, overall it's good stuff that I'm sure you'll find useful so this book gets the thumbs-up from me!

# **Everest Rides Again**

The much publicised 'world firsts' of jumping over Everest in October 2008 are set to happen again this year, with new records on the cards. Well known Kiwi skydiver Wendy Smith, last year's Director of Photography is now the European Event Organiser for the Nepali company Explore Himalaya. Returning also for this high altitude adventure is World Champion Omar Alhegelan, who will record it on film.

The project will offer jumps at 29,500 feet, in front of Everest, for both experienced and non-experienced skydivers (ie, tandem jumps). Special parachute equipment, including oxygen and thermal suits will be provided. Professional video and photo service will be available for each jump in one of the world's most extreme environments.

Swiss Boogie will once again supply a Pilatus Porter jump aircraft, taking off and landing on the world's highest DZ, Shyangboche, at 12,350 feet. Swiss boogie's director Henri Schurch will bring the technical jump and tandem instructor team plus pilot Ruedi Isenschmid.

The trip takes approximately two weeks, in order to fully acclimatise, trekking around national parks, with experienced mountain guides. Four different date

options are offered, each will have a group of 10-12 clients. Dates are as follows: 28 September – 11 October;

30 September – 13 October;

2-15 October; and 4-17 October.

During the Everest skydiving expedition 2008, conditions and facilities in Nepali schools shocked the Western adventurers so much that they organised a collection, raising over \$300,000. This new project aims to take this a step further with fundraising aimed at one million for the children's further education, new school buildings, mobile health clinics and clean water.

The founder of the International Charity 'Global Angels', Molly Bedingfield (mother of singers Natasha and Daniel Bedingfield), jumped over Everest in 2008. Molly is coming again this year to head up the fundraising for the Nepali children. Molly has launched a spin-off called the Global Angels Flying Academy, where, she says, "everybody who would like to be adventurous can earn their wings by doing sponsored flying or jumping to raise awareness and funds for children's projects".




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


#### 2009 Events Diary Now Published

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Stars of our sport shone bright at the airsports night of the year, the Royal Aero Club Awards Ceremony, held on 21 April at the Royal Air Force Club in London's Piccadilly.

HRH Prince Michael of Kent GCVO honoured those in airsports who had soared to new heights of performance, made outstanding flights, or dedicated their lives to their sport. After several glasses of strong orange juice (fizzy type) the citations began.

#### **Bodyflight Storm**

First up from the BPA were team Bodyflight Storm; Claire 'Sparky' Scott, Hannah Betts, Sarah Smith and Kate Stephens took the prestigious Prince of Wales Cup. Starting as a



scratch team, in the space of 1,500 team jumps they won the British Nationals 2007 in 4-way FS (beating their male rivals), then stormed to victory in the 2008 FS 4-way women's World Parachuting Championships. They achieved a best-ever performance, beating the USA and France and achieving a new world record score in women's 4-way FS.

#### **Sparky**

Next up was Sparky again, to be awarded the Gold Medal of the Royal Aero Club, as the highest-achieving female our sport has ever known. Sparky has won the World Championships an incredible five times in ten years. She was previously awarded the RAeC Gold medal in 2003, and was a member of two different teams that each won the Prince of Wales Cup.



#### **Volairkix**

Freefly team Volairkix, Andy Newell, Adam Mattacola and Mike Carpenter, achieved bronze at the 2008 World Freefly Championships at Mauberge, France – the first British



artistic events team to win a podium place, injecting new life into the discipline in the UK. For this milestone they were awarded the Royal Aero Club's Bronze Medal, which the guys accepted with their usual charm, charisma and cheeky smiles all round!

#### **Phil Curtis**

Phil Curtis was awarded a Certificate Of Merit for co-ordinating and taking part in the first ever television advert featuring a live skydive in May 2008. The formation dive spelled out HONDA. I'm sure we can all remember running to the TV after frantic texting to friends, waiting eagerly to see the formations build as the broadcast was timed exactly to fit a scheduled break on Channel 4. This ground-breaking event led to much public interest in the sport (as



well as the car being advertised). By proving what can be done, it will help the International Parachuting Commission in its efforts to attract TV coverage of parachuting competitions.

#### **Bob King**

A Royal Aero Club (RAeC) Certificate of Merit was awarded to Bob King. Having started parachuting in 1963, Bob went on to attend 36 British Championships and 20 World Championships in Style and Accuracy; initially as a competitor winning many medals including six golds, then as the British Team Manager and, ultimately, as Chief Judge at the World Championships.



#### Smudge

Another winner of an RAeC Certificate of Merit was Deane 'Smudge' Smith who, whilst taking part in a Canopy Piloting competition in Holland last August, saw another competitor hit the surface of the lake at high speed, and rushed to assist. He provided first aid on the spot. took command of recovering the casualty, and directed others to assist professionals to gain access. Tragically, the casualty died an hour later but the medical staff and officials praised Smudge for his response and exceptional leadership.





#### **Garth Greyling**

The Salomon's Trophy is awarded for outstanding airmanship and bravery. Garth Greyling was at the controls of a Turbine Islander at the Army Parachute Championships in Germany last year. After successfully despatching parachutists, the jumpmaster also exited. leaving Garth alone in the aircraft. Unfortunately the jumpmaster became entangled in the static line and was trapped trailing behind the aircraft. Garth climbed the aircraft to a safe height, and worked out he would have to trust the trim to keep the aircraft flying level and leave his seat to cut the static line free. He accomplished this successfully, being out of the pilot's seat for several minutes. This freed the jumpmaster, Jeremy Denning, pictured right, who then used his reserve to land safely. Garth's exemplary airmanship saved his life. This is the first time the Salomon's Trophy has been awarded to the pilot of a parachuting aircraft.





#### **Tony Knight**

Major awards from RAeC Member organisations, such as the BPA, were also presented. The Jim Crocker Sword was given to Tony Knight. The sword is awarded by the BPA, not annually, but only when there is an exceptional candidate who's made a significant contribution to UK skydiving over a long time period. Tony Knight has steered UK skydiving forward for over forty years, chairing the Safety and Training Committee for seven, establishing the BPA as a CAA-Approved organisation,



becoming a long standing Chairman of the BPA's Pilots Committee and defending our sport against threatening legislation.

#### History

The Royal Aero Club Awards first started more than a hundred years ago, in 1908. The Wright brothers were presented with gold medals after Orville Wright piloted the first powered aeroplane up to the height of 20 feet above a beach in North Carolina, then brother Wilbur flew for 59 seconds over a distance of 852 feet. It was truly an honour to receive a Royal Aero Club award when considering its historical origin, and prestigious past recipients.

#### **Inspiration**

The evening was inspiring, seeing so much going on in the entire airports world, not just parachuting. After Mike Carpenter covertly sneaked in his cheeky pose with HRH Prince Michael of Kent the award-winners made the most of the fine wine and food displayed on the very best Wedgwood tableware. It was another excellent show again by the BPA. Our Chairman John Smyth, who proposed all the BPA award-winners to the Royal Aero Club, commented "This has been a wonderful celebration of which the BPA can be justifiably proud. It was delightful to share in the joy with the recipients, and with so many of their families and friends."

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# UKSkydiver.co.uk What's that all about then?

#### What is UKSkydiver?

Around four years ago, a group of skydiving friends were sat in a bar, talking of RSLs, AADs and low pulls. Eventually the conversation got serious, culminating in a prolonged discussion on whether a dive with a pie would be accepted as a BPA PD1 sticker, Pie Dive 1. #### So what can new or wannabe skydivers get from UKS?

In this day and age, when friends instant message each other even though they're in the same room, most people turn to the internet as their first source of information. PD's professional competitive pilots have been teasing the skydiving world for some time, flying a prototype Velocity at many international meets and demonstrations. Now that the Competition Velocity has finally been released to the market, British canopy piloting team HEAT have been checking it out...

UK canopy piloting team *HEAT* got our hands on two state-of-the-art Competition Velocities (known in the trade as VCs). We have been breaking them in, making most jumps at altitude. Smudge [Deane Smith], flying a VC 96 with 300 HMA lines, extended his risers to 28 inches and opened up his cheststrap, using an RDS (Removable Deployment System) to allow the canopy to fly naturally. Alastair [Macartney] was flying a VC 79 with 300 HMA lines and, for our test flights, opted to keep the slider and pilot chute on, just to judge the difference between flight characteristics. The wing loading was 2.3 for Smudge on the VC 96 and 2.65 for Al on his VC 79.

#### Who is the VC suitable for?

As it states on the Performance Designs website, **the VC canopy is not intended for those purchasing their first cross-braced canopy**. It has been designed specifically for the competitive pilot who is already flying to the max and is looking for extra ways to get the edge.

#### What are its flight characteristics?

Many of the flight characteristics for the Competition Velocity are similar to the Velocity, as we know it. The differences between those canopies may be too subtle to be noticed by pilots who are new to the Velocity. But to the highly proficient Velocity pilot, these delicate improvements, if combined with proper training, practice and technique, could make quite a difference in their competition performance.

#### Is this what the PD Factory Team jump?

The PD Factory team have been using a prototype version of the VC for a number of years. As some of the top pilots in the competition world they have many thousands of jumps on this canopy and have set world records flying it.

## How is the VC wing different to the original Velocity?

To look at, you will notice very little difference, other than in the reduced drag brake lines, low profile pilot chute attachment point and reduced drag line attachments. The performance differences between these two canopies are due to subtle design changes in the aerofoil that are not very noticeable to the eye. If you were to lay both Velocities on top of each other, they look very similar. There are still seven cross-braced cells, the span and cord are similar and they have the same number of lines.

#### What sizes of VC are available?

The Competition Velocity is produced in sizes ranging from 111-71 square feet: 111, 103, 96, 90, 84, 79, 75 and 71sqft.



#### What type of line is used on the VC?

The canopies come with either 300 lb or 500 lb HMA. The lifespan of the 500 HMA line is greater than the 300 HMA but the 300 HMA gives the pilot less resistance as every little bit of drag is reduced. You will notice very little difference, with openings almost the same. We jump both canopies with the RDS all the time and very little has changed. The 300 HMA lines have to be replaced after 100-200 jumps and so aren't really suitable as a work canopy for everyday skydiving, and have an increased cost of maintenance.

The response to toggle input is similar although the brake lines have been extended some three inches, so the stall point is lower. In fact, the Competition Velocity will fly slower than the original Velocity before it stalls, due to a number of different factors combining to reduce the stall point.





#### How does it perform with front and rear risers?

There are many opinions thrown around dropzones on what it is best to use in the final turn to build up speed for landing; harness, rear risers or front risers? Personally front risers aren't my style. I initiate a harness turn combined with a little rear riser input, my hands already on the rears ready to tweak for a long, smooth, flat swoop. I fly rears because I believe in a smooth powered flight with a good element of accuracy. I feel that the extra speed gained by using front risers can sacrifice accuracy and you need to find the balance.

In these differing flight modes the canopy provides different responses; overall there are improvements in the wing response to rear riser input for use in competitive piloting. As it suggests in the PD Canopy Characteristics documents of the VC, most pilots who have flown the canopy state that it feels more powerful on the rears.

It also flies more efficiently on rears, which means it may be later before you feel the need to transfer to toggles.

The VC without doubt gives the competition pilot a chance of increasing his or her performance. The cost of a new canopy will dent your wallet some \$3,200. It is strongly recommended to approach canopy pilots who have flown the VC and are current in the CP world for tips.

Performance Designs has excellent wing loading charts, use them. It only takes a few minutes to download the 'Flight Characteristics' of any PD canopy; do you know yours?

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




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# PEOPLE IN THE SPORT

Dave has just been chosen for the 1995 Instructor of the Year award. If you feel you might like to become a BPA instructor, this interview will give you some tips

When did you start jumping Dave? My local DZ is Ipswich Parachure Centre where I have jumped regularly since 1987. I tarted jumping at Hakpenny Geom in 1981 moving to the Midland Parachuse Centre, then Long Manden, and now Ipswich. I have now completed 1500 jumps.

#### What made you decide you wanted to be an instructor?

Dave Rugg was a true free spirit who loved adventure and open spaces. He started skydiving at Halfpenny Green Parachute Centre in 1981, moving shortly afterwards to the Midland Parachute Centre, when it was originally based at Long Marston. He eventually became a core member of the infamous 'Slug Brothers' who were renowned for their achievements in speed star competitions and drinking beer. In the 1986 National Championships they attracted much acclaim as the only team to bring their own beer tent.

Dave had other pursuits that reflected his love of adventure. He was particularly attracted to wild places, snow and mountains and was described as a fearless skier. When he met Annie Isats (at a Sibson competition) he had found a soulmate. They made a great team and their shared interests took them to many different countries together. As well as skydiving and skiing, they loved walking and travelling in remote places. In 1995 Dave and Annie got married in a downtown chapel in Las Vegas. The whole wedding cost less than \$100 but left them with a great story. In 1996 they set off for nine months travelling around the world, on a trip which included the Himalayas in Nepal, the Far East, Fiji and the Cook Islands.

Dave and Annie initially settled in Ipswich and jumped regularly at Ipswich Parachute Centre, where Dave gained a BPA Instructor rating. In 1995 he was awarded the BPA Instructor of the Year trophy. He also gained a Tandem Instructor rating and completed over 2,000 jumps.

Dave's love of the skies eventually led him towards flying aircraft. He learned to fly at Ormond Beach in Florida and became a jump pilot in 2002 with UK Parachuting at Old Buckenham Airfield (the new Ipswich Parachute Centre).

Dave Rugg's life was one that touched many people. His popularity as a skydiver and more importantly as a person, rested on the fact that he was easy-going, generous, trustworthy and above all sincere in his dealings with others. He had an endearing personality that lacked any form of malice and because of this he attracted friends without effort. Testimony to this was well reflected at his funeral, which was a standing room only event, crowded with many friends and family.

Mark Cox, a long time friend and Slug Brother from the Long Marston days, gave a fitting eulogy for Dave at the funeral. He concluded aptly by saying "There's no question about it, the world is going to be a much lesser place without Dave in it.

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


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
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

#### **GENERAL NEWS**

#### **Lesley Gale Wins Mag Tender**

The Council at its April meeting considered the report of the Mag tender working party of the Communications Committee



Adrian Bond (Working Party Chairman, pictured below), Martin Soulsby (Communications Chairman) and Grant Richards, supported by Martin Shuttleworth, BPA Secretary-General. This was the culmination of a process started in autumn 2008 to appoint a contractor to go forward with the BPA Mag and associated publications, 2010-2. The purpose of the

tender was to benchmark the BPA Mag against the market and assure best value for the membership without compromising on quality.

19 intents to tender produced seven bids that yielded a shortlist of three. The shortlisted bidders – two publishing houses and the present Editor, Lesley Gale – were invited to a presentation and discussion at the BPA Office in March. From this two bids emerged as significantly stronger than the third, which was not progressed. The Council therefore had before it two high quality bids. After extensive discussion, the vote was 9-5 in favour of Lesley Gale. A contract will now be negotiated. Congratulating Lesley Gale on her successful bid, Martin Soulsby said that the tender process had been a valuable experience for the BPA, which had surveyed the market for niche publications such as ours. He thanked all who had been involved in the tender process, in particular Adrian



Bond for driving it and the BPA Office for its excellent support. Martin (left) said he was looking forward to an even better Mag over the coming years, and that the Communications Committee was keen to progress opportunities presented by new media, which were potentially very exciting, and chimed with IPC's vision of making skydiving a spectator sport.

#### Sou'wester Wanted

The Development Committee is looking for a BPA Member based in the southwest of England to act as the BPA Regional Representative. The role is to keep a watching brief on sporting developments in that Sport England area, as well as being a regional contact for our sport. It's not an onerous task! If you're interested, please email the BPA Office.

#### **Bingo Lotto Back**

Bingo Lotto – which last year granted £1,200 towards the cost of running BPA Coaching Roadshows for non-seniors – is back this summer. It promises to be bigger and better than before with tickets on sale from some 27,000 Tesco tills. Dropzones can also benefit directly by selling tickets through the Buddy Programme. The BPA belongs to the Bingo Lotto scheme that makes grants available for grass roots sport. It is run through the sport and recreation umbrella body CCPR.



#### Safeguarding in Sport

The BPA understands that the Government is to publish guidance on the effect on sport of new statutory requirements to safeguard vulnerable groups, ie, those aged under 18 and vulnerable adults including the elderly. The Safeguarding of Vulnerable Groups Act 2006 was passed as a result of a public inquiry into the murder of two schoolgirls in Soham by a school



Caretaker in 2002. The BPA is networking, through CCPR and the Royal Aero Club, with other sports governing bodies, as the new requirements are phased in over the next few years. We'll keep you posted

#### Fan of Freefly Roadshows





The Prodigy lyrics 'Let's jet out, we'll move at hyperspeed!' sprang to mind after witnessing some of the ultra dynamic free rounds on show at this year's World Challenge! This year proved to be the best yet with the overall level of flying being pushed, once again, to the absolute limit! After 2008's impressive performances no-one doubted that the level of technical flying would reach epic proportions this year. With the added incentive of bonus points available for new tricks and variations on set routines, the stage was set for some mind-bending freefly action!

Let's Get it On!
The first team to start were Team Bodyflight, last year's champions, and what a start it was. These guys really set the pace with some of the slickest flying I've ever seen. It was obvious that the Bodyflight boys were gonna be serious contenders for the top slot! Fast and deliberate, Team Bodyflight were very much at home in the big blue fun pipe and showed off some unbelievably complex freeflying that would prove hard to match. Following the fast pace of Bodyflight, the Skydive University team got stuck right in, showcasing some static body-surfing and funky centralised trick flying. Next up were Airkix Connection and Bodyflight Switzerland, who, in stark contrast to the previous team, both presented smooth and synchronised free rounds which included some nice interlocking orbits and some complex linked rotations. It was obvious that both these teams had really done their homework.

Team Future were back, quite literally bigger and better, and ready to take on the adults! Retaining their characteristic edgy style, the kids from Colorado presented a fast-paced and intricate routine that punched well above their weight. Outstanding stuff for a team with a combined age of 23! Next to enter the arena were Infinity Freefly who performed a nice but slightly disjointed free round. Considering both performers had only recently just 'got on their heads' it was a valiant effort.

Suddenly, like a bolt of white and slightly orange lightning, Babylon exploded onto the scene, showcasing a super stylish free routine that contained synchro flips, and some ultra fast carves and layouts. If Babylon were the lightning, then it was Volare who were the thunder at this year's World Challenge. Explosive and fast the Volare boys used up every inch of the 16 footer and filled their routine to the brim with some of the most outrageously slick tricks ever seen. Flying with such great power and attitude it was obvious that the Volare boys were hungry for this year's top slot.

Last but certainly not least were Team MK, another junior team. Meera and Maya Kansagra (aged 10 and 11), showed off a beautifully controlled and well balanced free routine mostly comprising of interlocking carves and smooth eagles. Very nice stuff for their first competition; these girls look set to go far.

The Need for Speed!
The focus changed from the stylised lines of the free rounds to the fast pace of the first compulsory round. Back and belly compulsories were the order of the day and the top teams took full advantage of the first speed round to pull ahead of the pack. Despite flying at lower wind speed and in a more relaxed orientation, the belly/back compulsories are by no means the easy option. They require a high degree of skill and self-discipline in order to complete a sequence at speed whilst maintaining a set heading.

### Mixing it Up

With initial rankings now posted, participants were ready to battle it out at all levels. For the top teams this was now their chance to mix it up a little and to start adding some well-rehearsed 'power moves'. Team Bodyflight certainly took advantage of this and cracked out a rotating head-to-head whilst moving into an eagle! This was answered by Volare pulling off a double head-down outfaced carving rodeo with a super fast 360° side transition. Both tricks got the desired response: 'Ooohs' from the judges and 'What the f%\*@?!' from some of the more unwitting spectators. Now it was Babylon's turn to add a little more kick-ass to their routine, busting out some wicked synchro flips 'n' twists and a hard-core twisted reverse double joker! Not to be outdone Team Future also threw in an ultra slick outface wishbone (transition through a double grip) and held it through a linked eagle!

It's worth noting that every one of these tricks is considered extremely complex and takes an almost superhuman degree of skill and spatial awareness to pull it off. What made it truly awesome is that these teams were able to throw the tricks into existing routines in such a way as to not break or disturb the overall aesthetic. Amazing stuff!

The last two compulsory rounds were of the head-up and head-down variety. All the competitors were focused and ready to push their skills to the limit. For the top two teams, Volare and Team Bodyflight, the compulsory rounds would prove decisive.

From the start Volare had kept hold of a slight lead over Team Bodyflight but, by the end of the last compulsory round, Bodyflight had managed to pull ahead by just 0.4. Time was running out and both teams knew it was looking like a sprint finish. Would Bodyflight keep the lead or could Volare claw it back?

Cool Sounds for the Last Rounds
The last round was also to be the last of the music rounds, where the teams perform their free routine to a soundtrack of their choice. Some of the more novel accompanying tunes ranged from Team MK's choice of the James Bond theme, tied in with some slightly surreal choreographed gun play and Team Future's choice, the exquisite Euro synth-pop ballad 'Rin Din Dang' by the Crazy Frog. Beautiful! Not taking themselves too seriously everyone else pretty much chose techno. I personally thought Volare's stuff would have gone nicely with Culture Club's 'Do You Really Want to Hurt Me?'

Joking aside, this was crunch time for Volare and Bodyflight. With only the narrowest of margins separating the two teams it would be, excuse the pun, a flight to the finish. Focused and ready, *Team Bodyflight* literally went full speed ahead from the word go and bust out a virtually flawless free round. This last round was not only *Team Bodyflight*'s best round of the whole competition but quite simply one of the best free rounds ever executed! Incredible stuff!

As each team gave it their all for the last round, Volare (second last to go) prepared for the final showdown. Like miniature black and blue cruise missiles the Volare boys cut around the tunnel with one target in mind, the gold. It was a valiant effort but would it be enough? Sadly for Volare the answer was no. Team Bodyflight had flown an unbelievably cool last round and through its execution had retained their lead. Fabien Raidel and Michael Mackenzie had done it in style and for a second year in a row. Congrats fellas!

#### Special Stuff

Obviously there was so much cool stuff going on that it would be impossible to give a blow-by-blow account of all the special bits presented by the top teams. Some of the more memorable manoeuvres were:

• Volare's Adam Mattacola pulling off a full 360 degree linked rotation inside a double wishbone and the team doing a double foot-to-foot rotation in a full layout position.







• Team Bodyflight pulling off a blind (both performers facing outwards, one head-down and one head-up) linked footto-foot rotation followed by Mike Mackenzie's supersonic head-down helicopter in a carve.

Team Future banging out one of their free rounds wearing FS suits... as if it's not hard enough! Come on guys, you're going to make the rest of us look bad!

Airkix Connection throwing in a non-rehearsed exit comprising Jean Charles Guinot going head-down on the net by the exit door and letting teammate, Marcus Schwarz, fly feet-first through his legs. A move that must have, quite literally, taken some balls to pull off. Now that's commitment!

 Finally who could forget Bedford's own Jed Parker who showed all the freeflyers how true artistic movement and choreography should be executed. Nice one dude.

**Well Done People**Well done to all the competitors for some fantastic, ground-breaking flying. A big thanks to the judging team (Al, George, Yoko and Johanna) who did an amazing and difficult job and of course the Bodyflight Bedford team for organising and running such an amazing event.

#### 4-way FS

For the last three years the Bodyflight Challenge has been an exceptionally well run world class event attracting the top teams in the world, and the 2009 event was better than ever. Forty-six teams travelled to Bedford from all over the world for the meet, which is now considered one of the major events on the FS calendar.

AAA Teams
The AAA event line-up was of an extremely high calibre. Teams included the top three teams from last year's World Meet - reigning world champions Arizona Airspeed, unbeaten in their last 16 competitions; France Maubeuge, last year's silver medallists in France; and bronze placed team, Belgium's Hayabusa Defence. We also had our very own XL who reunited especially for the event

The Challenge sits with the US-based Valentine's Meet and the Shamrock Showdown in providing teams with an opportunity to benchmark their progress early in the year against their major rivals before the lead-up to Nationals, World Cups and World Meets. It is also one of the only competitions where newly formed and scratch teams can compete alongside the top professionals. A number of teams were also of mixed nationalities, an example of how diverse and transient our sport is.

The AA event also had an international flavour with teams Fast Arrows from the Czech Republic and Team Future from the US. Team Future came onto the radar last year with brother and sister duo Justin and Kayla Tinucci just 10 and 13 years respectively, competing in freefly together and in 4-way with their 'grown-up' coaches.

This year's event also presented a new challenge in that you could only enter the tunnel through one door. This made the start to each round a bit more exciting as teams strived to launch the first point intact - sometimes with hilarious consequences!



**Practice Rounds and Draw**The meet kicked off at 8am with the usual pre-competition briefing which was swiftly followed by the practice rounds, giving the teams to determine the airspeed they would need during the meet. The teams were then given the competition draw which







was considered to be fairly average although it did include an all-random dive (A,C,E,H,K) in round 4, a flight which had the potential of winning or losing the meet.

#### Rounds 1-3

Round 1 kicked off promptly and as expected Arizona Airspeed took the lead with a 23. It was a slow round (17,10,4) and so just 3 points separated the top three teams. In AA, Team Future lead by 2 points.

Round 2 saw another high round score by Airspeed, this time shared with France Maubeuge, both teams scoring 26. Belgium's Hayabusa posted the second-highest score showing that their progression had not faltered since last year's World Meet, despite a team member change and a change of slots.

Round 3 swiftly followed with a faster sequence (G,7,D,9) and Perris Fury hit back with the highest score of 38, showing great mental determination following their disappointing performance in round 2 where they were busted down to 20. After three rounds Airspeed were leading by 5 points, whilst a tight race was developing below with just 3 points separating the next four teams. Meanwhile in AA, Team Future had extended their lead to 12 points and already looked to be the firm favourites.

#### Random Round 4

Round 4 in AAA was the all-random round that had the potential of shaking up the leader board. Mistakes would be costly. It was an exciting round to watch with lots of ooohs and aaahs as teams either raced through the fast sequence glitch-free or suffered breakdowns



along the way. Good communication and staying calm was absolutely essential! Perris Fury continued their comeback with a 59, the highest ever score in tunnel competition history! (That's 1.7 formations every second!) Their performance whilst calm looked on fire and they outscored Hayabusa by 3 and Airspeed by 6, giving them the vital points not just to get back in the race, but to take the overall lead by 1 point. France Maubeuge had a bad round dropping them from second place to fifth, trailing XL by five points.

Close of Play on Saturday
After the excitement of round 4, the tables turned again, *Airspeed* hitting back with a 29, the high score for the round, giving them a comfortable 6 point lead at the end of the first day. Perris Fury were again heavily penalised, scoring just 22 putting them into second, just 1 point ahead of Hayabusa in third with XL 4 points behind in fourth.

Lower down the field, UK's Satori (who had brought in a big gun ringer in former Airspeed member Brian Johnson) were closely battling it out with the young talented team Kaktus Hunter from Russia, both teams winning and losing rounds against each other. Whilst there wasn't a separate women's category, an interesting race was developing between UK's Pussy Galore (a hybrid of Bodyflight Storm and Elan) and France's women's national team Aerokart Deep Blue, last year's bronze medallists in Maubeuge, who'd been training hard since. Pussy Galore, despite having lots of fun and grinning during every round, were keen to continue GB's dominance in this category, and led the French by 7 points at close of play.

In AA, Team Future had extended their lead to 16 points over Fast Arrows in second. An exciting race was also developing between the UK teams with Funbar leading the pack by 1 point over Random Vengeance followed by Strangers and then Unagi not far behind.

So onto day two and, with the fast rounds completed, the second half of the draw was slow in comparison with just four of the fourteen randoms drawn left to do.

Airspeed continued to extend their lead showing that they are the masters in block technique, being the highest scorers in three of the five remaining rounds. In round 8, XL and Hayabusa both scored the highest (25) which, coupled with 2 points XL had won back from the judges in round 5, meant that XL were back in the race for third place. Perris Fury and France Maubeuge claimed the highest scores in round 9 with a 22.

In AA Team Future looked unstoppable putting up scores that could challenge some of the AAA teams. In the UK competition, Random Vengeance and Funbar continued their tight race with just 2 points separating them going into the final round.

#### **The Final Round**

The viewing of round 10 was delayed until all teams had been judged, allowing everyone to watch the round in the hangar. To increase the excitement those teams battling it out with their nearest rivals were shown at the same time on a split screen, which again produced lots of ooohs and aaahs!

#### **AAA Results**

In AA it was no surprise when Airspeed, who had performed consistently across all rounds, again posted the highest score (their sixth of the meet), earning them their fourth consecutive World Challenge victory with a whopping 28.8 average.

Fury came second with a 27.7 average, 11 points behind Airspeed. They won three of the rounds over Airspeed and are gradually edging closer in the all-important selection year for the 2010 World Meet. Whilst Hayabusa and XL's third and fourth places didn't change from round 4, the margin was reduced just to 2 points. Satori won their battle over Kaktus Hunter by just 1 point whilst Pussy Galore finished a resounding 9 points ahead of France's Aerokart Deep Blue.

In AA, *Team Future* finished a clear 32 points ahead of *Fast Arrows* with an 18.4 average. Random Vengeance finished as the highest UK team with a 13.8 average, 12 points ahead of Strangers who were 6 points ahead of Funbar. Single A team Unagi did a great job adapting to the AA blocks finishing with a very respectable 11.4 average in their first AA competition.

The awards ceremony followed and, as well as the coveted cheques and medals, a number of manufacturer prizes were also awarded to teams that impressed the judges during the meet.

#### 2010 World Challenge

So, another Bodyflight World Challenge completed and still the Airspeed machine seems to be unstoppable. Dates for the 2010 Challenge have already been set (3-4 April) so, if you want to compete at a world class event on your doorstep, alongside the best teams in the world, start planning now. The field of teams gets stronger every time and 2010, a World Meet year, will be no exception!

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# Pat Hammond

# "You'll be alright my boy" "Come on young lady, let's get in the air"

...a gentle smile and a shake of the head; some of the many sayings and mannerisms that characterised Pat Hammond.

It is with great sadness that I write this obituary to commemorate Pat's life, a loss that no amount of words can ever truly describe. Although those who had the pleasure of knowing him are deeply saddened by his passing, we should also be mindful that Pat had a wonderful, fulfilled life and touched many people with his unrelenting enthusiasm for life and his incredible passion for CRW.

If you knew Pat you were indeed lucky. Not many people have such a generous nature and think of others in the way he did. On the evening I learned of his death, I sat in my garden and looked up at a brilliant blue sky and was immediately struck by the fact that Pat would never be up there again. My eyes came down to earth and I noticed that I was sitting on the patio he'd helped me build, I looked across to the wall where I'd placed the bird box he'd given me and smiled as it had become the nest for a pair of blue tits (one of Pat's little known interests).

The next day at work on the DZ, where Pat had worked for nearly ten years and had been instrumental in encouraging the local community to let us operate, there were signs of him everywhere; he had either built or been involved in building most of it.

# **The Early Years**

Pat was born on Christmas Eve, 1936, in Cambridge where he spent his childhood years. It's a time of his life that he rarely spoke about to his family, except for telling Joyce that he was 'one of the lags'.

Pat's first love was for motorcycles and he worked as a mechanic after leaving school. In March 1955, aged 18, he joined the 1st Battalion of The Royal Norfolk Regiment as a volunteer, gaining an award for being 'the best all-round recruit' in the autumn of the same year. Pat was later promoted to Lance Corporal and worked for the Quarter Master who, when describing Pat in a report said: "Pat possessed sound common sense... he was honest and loyal, will work long hours without supervision and is a kind man with a pleasant personality." He went on to say: "I recommend this hard working, good type of man to any employer", a statement that is so true for everything Pat did during his life.

During his three years' service he served in Baor, Germany, twice and in Cypres before leaving when he was 21. On leaving the army Pat did a deal, exchanging a lorry-load of coal for a driving licence, but in 1967 took an advanced test to prove he was actually safe on the roads!

Pat then worked again as a motorcycle mechanic for Claude Scott, based in Cambridge. During this time he was a member of the Cambridge Matchless Motorcycle and Car Club where in 1958, he won the skilful riding contest. He later became a great motorcycle scrambler and in 1960 won the Grand National at Cadwell Park. Unfortunately, this era came to an abrupt end when he had an accident at a race meeting. Pat emerged unscathed but his bike went under the safety ropes and he broke the legs of a lady who was spectating, for which he never forgave himself.

In 1961, Pat started as a car mechanic at Mosses in Cambridge where he worked his way up to Car Servicing Manager before being made redundant when the company closed in 1991, having been with them for 30 years. He tried his hand at various jobs after this but was never able to really settle anywhere, until he started working at Chatteris.

## **Joyce**


It was when he was home on leave from the army in 1957 that Pat met his wife-to-be, Joyce, at Hornir gsea Youth Club. They married on 26 August 1961 and lived in Chesterton where their first daughter, Toni-Ann, was born in July 1964. They later moved to Cambridge where Helen, their second daughter, was born in June 1966.

Pat and Joyce settled and made a family home at Green Park, Brinkley, where they lived together for 42 years. In 1999, Pat became a very proud grandad for the first time to Madison and then again to Harriet in 2002.









## **Pat's Other Hobbies**

After Pat's first hobby of scrambling he went in a completely different direction and started breeding tropical fish before becoming interested in Australian parakeets and, when he ran out of room in the garden for them, he bought a plot of land where he kept over 70 breeding pairs of birds along with an assortment of ornamental ducks.

Pat loved to travel around Europe with his family. Every holiday they would pack their tent into the car, and in later years hitch up the caravan, to cross the channel by ferry to tour around such places as Switzerland, Italy and Norway.

# Pat the Skydiver

Aged 49, Pat started skydiving, out of the blue, in 1985 after deciding to complete a sponsored static line jump in an effort to raise money for the Girl Guide group run by his daughter, to buy camping equipment. After a weekend of training at Sibson, Pat made his first and second jump on the same day.

Despite his instant love of the sport, Pat was never really a fan of freefall and very quickly found CRW and a home DZ in Ipswich Parachute Centre. 23 years and 2,492 jumps later, he was still introducing people to canopy formation (CF) and was happiest doing so. He couldn't do enough for his students, lending them his rigs to get them in the air, travelling miles around the country and flying abroad, often to Spain or Ireland, to introduce some unsuspecting newcomer to the world of CF. Most of us who knew him succumbed at some point, with some enjoying it so much that they went on

Pat's skydiving achievements speak for themselves. He entered the Guinness Book of Records in 1988 after completing 14 round jumps in an hour at Abbotsley. He was on several record CF stacks, he took part in 37 displays,

14 night jumps, a balloon jump and two water jumps. His competition record is fantastic; 13 bronze, 23 silver and 47 gold medals in his CRW/CF career. He was part of the British team that won a bronze medal at the 2006 World Championships for the 8-way CF competition.

Pat never stopped competing and collected a raft of medals at this year's AGM. He was a true leader of the UK's CRW community, working hard to progress the sport, running weekend seminars, coaching roadshows and training teams, including a female team who went on to form a record stack.

Pat was known at all UK dropzones and always encouraged those who hadn't yet tried CRW to give it a go. He passionately defended the sport to anybody who didn't understand it or thought it wasn't a good use of a skydive. His presence on any DZ always added an infectious energy and there are endless stories both in-air and on the ground that will live on across the skydiving community.

# **Working with Pat**

Pat was of the old school and happy about it, a nightmare in the modern world of health and safety! The number of times I had to tell him, "Get off the roof, you silly old fool!"

However, despite his sometimes daring approach to work, even he would have had to admit that perhaps he wasn't the best electrician in the world. It's safe to say that the population of a village near Chatteris can sleep easy now that Pat won't be able to cut off their power supply with a JCB any more! Pat managed to mistake marsh gas, whilst digging, for a major electricity cable - all power in the local village promptly went off! It was on another occasion when, working on the canteen roof, he managed to make the whole thing live and electrocute himself, that the game was up!

I recall working with him in the cesspit one day, a particularly grim ob after a pipe had burst and we had to dig a pit, endir g up waist-deep - and deep in waste! - to fix the problem. Afterwards, I suggested a beer which he agreed was a good idea. It turns out he wasn't really a drinker - we shared a can and about half an hour later he told me that he worse for wear and couldn't drive home. Two coffees was a lie-down sorted him out.

# ue Friend

Pat had strong opinions and wasn't afraid to air them but he held a grudge. Just like any good mate, if he thought you were wrong he told you so - and when you thought it, he was mostly right. Pat was without doubt the sort abou ke that, if it all went wrong, you would want him by your side. He was as strong as an ox and could still put up a good fight at the age of 72. I bet the blokes he served with in my were glad he was on their side.

a true legend of our sport and somebody who will be sorely missed by his fantastic family and his many, many friends but who will always bring a smile to your face when thinking about. I would say 'rest in peace mate' but Pat wasr 't a restful sort. Joyce received a message of condolence which

paid perfect tribute to Pat: "I just hope God likes Canopy Relative Work. If he doesn't, Pat ill teach him".

In discussions about reserve rides with wingsuits. I was asked if there might be any relationship or common factors between them.

Let me try to answer that question this way – prevention is better than cure!

It is always a risk to talk about incidents that I have not personally observed. But generally I have seen many wingsuit pilots who are not 100% stable when it comes to pull time. They think they are – but they aren't! In addition to the low rate of descent caused by a wingsuit, this may be the first step in the wrong direction.

Before we start a discussion about substitutes like 'longer bridle', 'bigger pilot chutes', etc, we should address body position on deployment.

# Pull High, and Stable

Always stop your wingsuit flight a little higher than a normal skydive. In the beginning, 5,000 feet (1,500m) should be pull time for you. Tell manifest that you need to pull a little higher. Step by step you can lower your pull altitude down to 3,500 feet (1,000m). No 'Bird' should pull lower; this way you allow yourself time to concentrate on a clean pull. It will also give you time enough to open all your zips – or to deal with 'Plan B' (LQRS or whatever is needed, see later). If you were caught by surprise and find yourself lower than you should be, your pull might result in a frantic, non-stable action, the result of trying to get your main out asap! So? Pull high, pull high and stable (like AFF, remember!), close all your wings before you pull – and don't forget to 'wave off' beforehand ('Birds' do that by tapping toes).





Jump a Suitable Canopy If you jump an elliptical or semielliptical and kind of aggressive small main canopy, you will face even more problems right after a not so stable pull and opening. Experience shows that elliptical canopies don't come out of a line twist by themselves; in most cases they make the twists worse. I have 1,200 wingsuit flights now, with only **one** cutaway: I had an elliptical main at that time. This is the reason all wingsuit flight manuals say 'don't jump an elliptical canopy'.

I myself like to fly my second 7-cell Spectre 120 now; the one I have today is 1,800 jumps old and still quite good! But Sabres, Quadras, everything that is non-elliptical, is okay too!

# Practice Makes Deployment Perfect

Okay, when it comes to 'technique', let's talk 'body-technique'! When you are high enough on deployment, you have all the time you need to make sure you are symmetrical and stable. Even if you need a second attempt, you are not in a hurry! You can practise this if you like; think 'wingsuit' but jump without a wingsuit, practise the perfect wingsuit body position for pull time! If you find you still deviate in this moment, maybe you are not ready for a real wingsuit flight just yet. There is more information about this in the many wingsuit flight manuals? RTFM! (Read The \*\*\* Manual)

# Be Ready

One technique I myself use; I put both hands on the two arm wing release handles, right after I pull. Do I need them? Well at least I'm ready. And if not? I can let them go again! And open the zips instead, as planned.

# ick Release Legs

I am a big fan of LQRS, the Leg Quick Release System. This option doesn't cost so much extra, and will always provide you with the opportunity to kick out line twists, etc.





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Maggie Penny, co-owner and operator of Wild Geese Parachute Centre, Northern Ireland, talks to Lesley Gale...

# Do you have good facilities?

We have excellent facilities at Wild Geese. A purpose-built hangar houses the office, aircraft and all training facilities. We operate a Cessna Caravan 208A and a Cessna 206. A soundproof classroom was recently installed in the hangar so all student training would be centralised, with six fan trainers, a Dick Gays harness, 16 sets of suspended harnesses, three mock-ups, manifest area, a competition-size accuracy tuffet, and extensive packing arenas. Outdoors there is the restaurant, bunkhouse accommodation, toilets, showers and a barbecue area.

# How long have you been operating?

Wild Geese was formed on 3 May 1983, so we celebrated our quarter century last year.

# How did the celebrations go?

The 25th anniversary was brilliant and well supported with Gordon Hodgkinson and Ronan Whelan organising an FS skills camp, and Ian Marshall and Pat Hammond conducting a BPA CF roadshow. That was lovely, as lan Marshall was one of our first permanent instructors. The festivities included a pig-roast, thanks to the efforts of Jade Mullin.

# **How many DZs are** there in Ireland?

We are the only drop zone in Northern Ireland. There are two (non-BPA) in Southern Ireland.

# Do you welcome visitors?

We most certainly do! As we are isolated geographically, we are delighted to see visitors from any country.

# What's the best way to travel?

We have three airports - the George Best Airport in Belfast; Belfast International which is in Antrim (very Irish!); and the City of Derry, in Londonderry. There are two ferry ports - Belfast and Larne. We are always happy to pick anyone up from an airport or ferry terminal if they let us know in advance.

# And the best places to stay?

We have excellent hotels and B&Bs in the area – all along the north coast is particularly attractive to tourists, hence we also have excellent restaurants.

# When is a good time to visit?

Unfortunately the Irish weather is probably more unpredictable than other areas but May-June or August-September are probably best.

# Tell me about the local

If people want to be active there is horse-riding, dirt-biking, paint-balling, swimming, surfing and gliding. The north coast is particularly beautiful, with the famous
Giant's Causeway, Carric-a-rede rope
bridge, harbour villages and sandy beaches.

# How are relationships with the locals?

Relations with the local community are excellent – I was brought up in the area and most of my family still live close by. We try to include the locals in any celebrations, such as the pig-roast, official openings, competition presentations, etc.

What are the most popular disciplines?
I think the most active discipline is still flat-flying, though freeflying is becoming increasingly popular, as are wingsuits We have coaches for our regular weekend operations and bring coaches in from Southern Ireland when we are organising on a larger scale.

How does skydiving differ in Ireland?
Because of our position geographically we do not have the same movement of skydivers from DZ to DZ, so tend to be a more closed community, which is why we welcome visitors and encourage our own skydivers to travel to the mainland and abroad.

Do you have university clubs? Queen's University Club is very active and jump most Wednesday afternoons in addition to weekends.

# What events are

planned this year?
We have another FS skills camp in July and have offered to host the Shamrock Challenge in September. That's the brainchild of Gordon Hodgkinson, who's based at the Irish Parachute Club, and aims to build bigger and better formations.

# You have an annual trip abroad, where and why?

Our annual trip is to Skydive Portugal in March. One of our instructors organised it in the beginning and it grew from there, numbers increased and we were always looked after extremely well in the Algarve.

# ls your membership rising or falling?

Our membership has remained fairly steady. Skill levels are improving and we should really be taking advantage of the BPA coaching roadshows.

What do you try to make Wild Geese into?
We try to cater for all disciplines but ours is really a small dropzone, numbers-wise. I always felt my responsibility was to look after students who are, after all, the next skydivers. We try at Wild Geese to make everyone feel welcome, but that is the way of the Irish anyway.

And the future?
We plan to continue to maintain our safety standards, enhance our facilities, increase our instructor pool and really push Raps courses

Ten years ago Performance Designs launched the 'top of the range' cross-braced, 21-cell Velocity canopy onto the market. Since then the Velocity has been at the forefront of ram-air parachute performance. Of course the designers at PD did not sit back and rest on their laurels; almost immediately the Velocity was released they started with research and development that would enable them to introduce its successor some time in the future. Well, the future has arrived and the 'Competition Velocity' is now with us.

During this decade of research the company tells us it has experimented with changing stabiliser design or eliminating them altogether, adding two to four more cells, trying new bracing technology, different aerofoils and various planform shapes. PD reports that some of these ideas did improve performance, and some definitely did not. But the culmination of all this work over the years has produced a cutting edge canopy, which PD promises will have you "standing on the podium, rather than looking up at it".

The Competition Velocity differs from its stablemate in the design of the brake lines, the low profile pilot chute attachment point and

reduced drag line attachment points. The new canopy also comes with a removable deployment system (RDS) as standard. The lines of choice for the serious swoop monster are 300 HMA which, as we reported in a previous Kit News, have a very limited life and are not recommended for normal skydive use, but have the edge for serious swooping. More durable 500 HMA lines are also available.

PD points out that the new canopy was not designed or intended for those purchasing their first cross-braced canopy. The company went on to say, "the differences between the two canopies may be too subtle to be noticed by pilots new to the Velocity, but to the highly proficient Velocity pilot these subtle differences, combined with proper training, practice and technique, could make the difference in their competition performance."

The Competition Velocity, which should not be seen as a replacement for the standard Velocity but as a premium product, is available in eight sizes from 71 to 111 square feet.

# **Ripcord Revolution**



Bill Booth, of United Parachute Technologies, the innovative designer of the Vector series of containers and the man who brought the throwaway pilot chute and the 3-ring cutaway system to our sport, has now come up with an idea, which deviates from decades of standard practice. From almost the advent of freefall parachuting, rig manufacturers have used metal ripcord cables and pins to open reserve parachute containers. Well now Bill has developed a ripcord made from Spectra line - the lightweight, thin line as used for Slink removable soft links, reserve closing loops and, most commonly of course, the suspension lines of most modern ram-air canopies.

The Spectra ripcord replaces the standard metal cable with a length of 1,000 pound test Spectre line (suspension lines are usually either 550 or 825lbs) with a finger-trapped and bar-tacked loop at each end. A short piece of bungee cord is bar-tacked inside the middle section of the Spectra to provide elasticity. One loop is larks-headed to either a Metal D-handle or soft pad and the other loop forms an 'eye' for the RSL ripcord pin to go through. The system can only be used with a Vector RSL/Skyhook system.

Bill claims that the Spectra ripcord is stronger than the steel alternative and produces lower pull forces because the Spectra is slipperier and slides through the housing with less friction. The elastic mid-section of the ripcord takes up the necessary slack, therefore there is no 'ball swadge' left hanging out from the handle to catch on things.

The elastic mid-section also means that if the handle is inadvertently dislodged from its pocket it will be automatically pulled up against its housing, making a 'floating ripcord' a problem of the past. And finally, the Spectra ripcord is cheaper to produce than the alternative.

Bill went on to assure us that Spectra ripcords have been 'tested' in all Sigma tandem systems for many years as main ripcords. The same housings were used and these main ripcords lasted for hundreds of actual pulls with no sign of wear.

# **Visually Digital**

Carrying on the legacy of Leonardo da Vinci those aerial innovators of Parasport Italia have released onto the market the latest update of their Altitron digital altimeter. The original Altitron was introduced 15 years ago and was one of the first visual altimeters with a digital, rather than an analogue (dial and needle), face.

The 2009 Altitron is a water-resistant, back-lit, digital visual altimeter, which also doubles as a speed meter and electronic 300-jump logbook. Parasport tells us that the high contrast LCD is easily readable in any light conditions and is protected by a 2mm thick anti-scratch and anti-shock methacrylate lens.

Three buttons give access to all the unit's functions, which include a visual break-off altitude signal, apart of course from the usual data now available on most freefall data processors.

The low power stand-by mode means there is no need to turn the unit on and off because battery consumption is low. Its commonly available type AAA 1.5v battery will last for about two years we're told. The Altitron comes with a velcro strap to fix the unit to forearm or wrist, but it can also be used in the pocket of a jumpsuit or on the back of the hand using a special hand-mount.

As JM's Newsround reported in the last issue of your fave Mag, BJ Worth and his World Team of large formation record-breakers will be setting off again in 2011 for an attempt to break the 400-way record they set in 2006.



In order to give themselves sufficient time to build a 444-way or larger, and still start the tracking and separation procedure at a safe altitude, BJ and his team feel it's necessary to go even higher than the 24,500 feet from which the 400 was built.

In order to go higher, communal 'on-board' oxygen systems that have been used for all previous



large formation records, which only provide the skydiver with oxygen whilst in the aircraft, will have to give way to individual 'bail-out' oxygen bottles.

The proposed bail-out system went through its initial live trials at the Thai Sky Fest earlier this year with positive results. Plans are to continue with altitude-testing at several coming events such as Jump for the Cause.

The system, which each individual will carry, consists of a beer-bottle-shaped container fitted with a valve and pressure gauge, which is easily slipped down the front of the jumpsuit, and a plastic tube 'nasal cannular system which routes up inside a full-face helmet.

# **Collecting the Data**

Paratec of Germany, manufacturer of the Next harness/container system and Speed reserve amongst other good things, has been carrying out test jumps on its new Century Tandem system using a highly sophisticated flight data recorder that measures parameters such as opening shock (3D G-Force recorder), rate of descent, ground speed, toggle pressure, and turn acceleration.

Although other devices of this type have been used before by parachute manufacturers, Paratec tells us that none of them have been able in the past to clock the data at 100Hz (100 readings per second).

# Release Released

Following the successful introduction of the Z1 EVO ratchet chin-cup, Parasport Italia has now produced what it calls the HQR (Headgear Quick Release) system.


The HQR has been designed by Parasport to be purchased as an option for their Z1 EVO open-faced helmet or as a complete kit that can easily be installed on most popular open-face helmets from other manufacturers, either with a chinstrap or chin-cup, or both. The HQR is a simple and reliable emergency quick-release system, which is designed to allow a cameraflyer to escape from an entanglement between helmet and canopy.

The system consists of a chin-strap/chin-cup combined with a U-Terminal and a grub screw to install on the outside of the helmet. Detailed and simple mounting instructions are provided to allow a correct installation.

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


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# **Dunkeswell**
